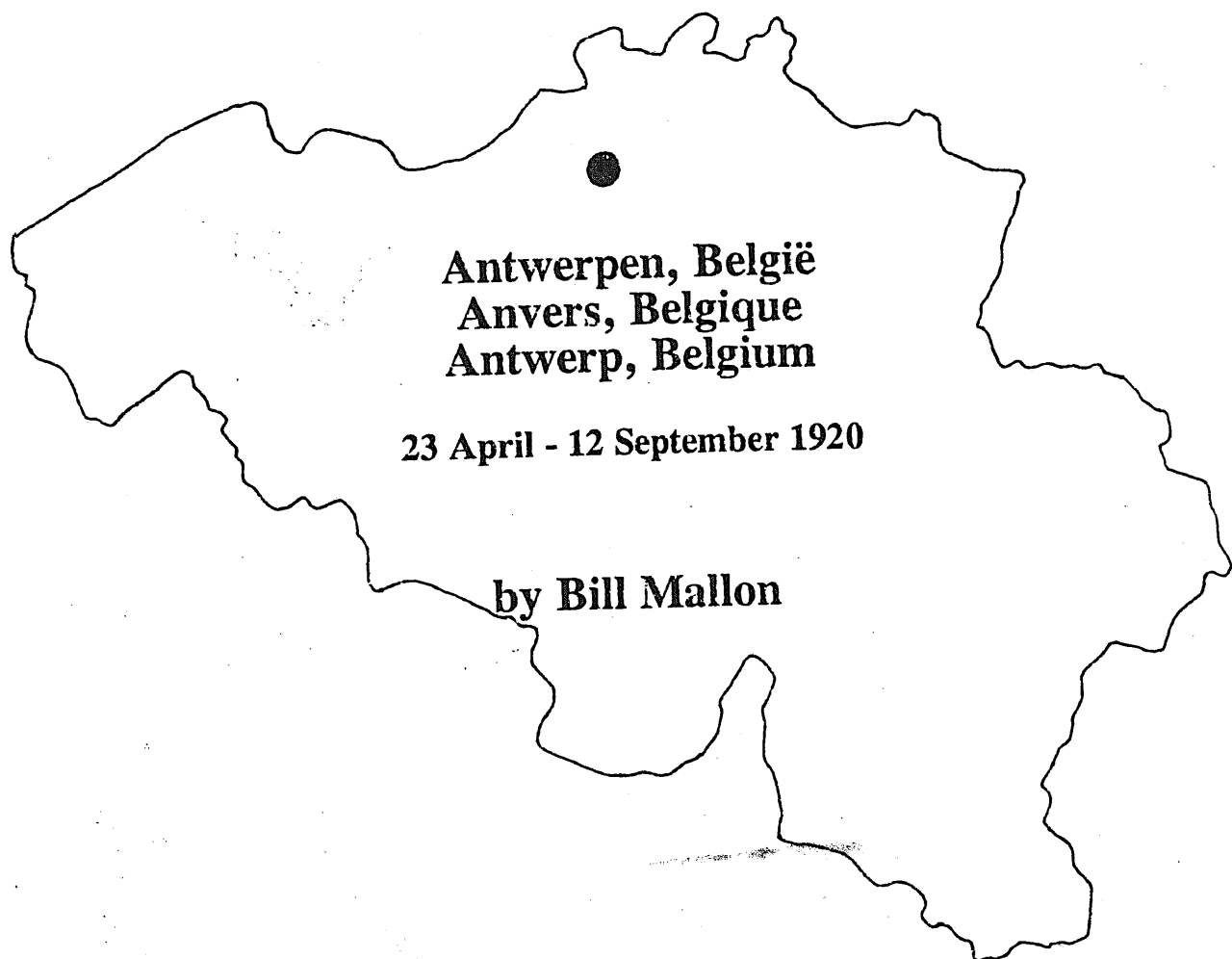

Almost nothing is known about the 1920 archery events except the results. The moving bird target events were held in a park in the city of Antwerp, but the exact location is also not known. It is unknown if the fixed bird target events were held at the same site. Belgium's Hubert Van Innis starred, winning four gold and two silver medals.

¹⁵In the team events, EK and DW give point totals which differ from FW and FM in most cases. I have used point totals from the *New York Herald Tribune* (International Edition), which agree in all cases with EK and DW.

¹⁶FW and FM give 2,927 points.

¹⁷FW and FM give 2,317 points.

¹⁸FW and FM listed a combined team event at both 33 and 50 metres. FW omitted the 50 metre team event altogether, while FM did list that separately.

¹⁹FM gives 2,698 points. As noted above, FW did not list this event.

²¹Very little is known about this event. It really is not known if it was two events, one for small birds, and one for large birds, or a single combined event shooting at both size targets. Only one team competed.
