

HENRY KJELSON

— our new Honorary President

The FITA Congress in Prague in 1957 unanimously elected Mr. Henry Kjellson, Sweden, Honorary President of FITA for lifetime.

Mr. Kjellson became an archer in 1932, and became the Champion of the World in 1934 at Båstad, Sweden. In 1940, when the Swedish Archery Association was started, he became the first Chairman, a position which he is still holding, to the benefit of the development of archery in Sweden.

He and his wife—Tina—have been Swedish Champions many times. At the 1938 World Championship Tournament in London, Tina was number four at the 35 m distance, and number six at the short distances totally.

In 1949 Henry was elected President of FITA, during the Paris

Tournament, after having been one of the Vice Presidents since 1946. In 1955 he received the FITA Gilt Plaque for International Merits.

Mr. Kjellson was born on 8th August 1891. In 1910 he became the Ground Engineer of the famous Swedish aviator Baron Cederström. Since then he has worked for the Royal Swedish Air Force as a technical expert, ranked with a colonel. He has constructed no less than ten aeroplanes, and was a V2 expert during the Second World War. He is now working with the Royal Swedish Patent Office in Stockholm.

His technical skill has also made him an expert on bows and arrows. The archers of the world deeply respect our new Honorary President.

OSCAR KESSELS

Président de la Fédération Internationale de Tir à l'Arc

La Belgique sportive a salué avec grande sympathie la consécration des qualités d'homme et de sportif de Mr. Oscar Kessels lorsque la Fédération Internationale de Tir à l'Arc l'a appelé à sa Présidence.

C'est, en effet, un champion incomparable qui se double d'un administrateur très averti, que les archers des cinq continents ont choisi pour être leur chef de file et leur porte-drapeau.

Oscar KESSELS a fait ses preuves à la fois sur le terrain et devant la traditionnelle »table au tapis vert» où se discutent et se règlent les questions intéressant la vie même des clubs... Son palmarès est extrêmement brillant: il a conquis dans presque tous les pays du monde des trophées que lui disputait une concurrence très relevée. Au cours de tournois où se rencontraient, l'arc au poing, les plus fameux spécialistes de notre époque, il parvient bien souvent à imposer sa maîtrise.

Il préside, en Belgique, le Grand Serment Royal des Archers de St-Sébastien de Bruxelles, fondé en 1381 et placé sous le Haut Patronage de S. M. le Roi Baudouin. Des archers belges il est l'»Empereur»... car, suivant la règle, ayant trois fois conquis le titre de »Roi» la couronne suprême a été définitivement posée sur sa tête!

Champion du Monde sur 90 m. individuel en 1934 (à Båstad-Suède) il a participé à douze des quinze championnats mondiaux organisés depuis 1931: il reste sur la brèche et n'entend pas remiser son carquois, avant longtemps... Et je ne puis omettre de vous dire que Oscar KESSELS est mon dévoué et fidèle collaborateur, en tant qu'Administrateur-Trésorier Général du Comité Olympique Belge.

Il est recordman de Belgique depuis 1952 du tir au m/m. en 15 flèches avec une distance totale de 561 m/m.

L'»Empereur» est un homme heureux: il a su organiser harmonieusement son existence: l'industriel notoire, qui dirige une affaire très importante sur le marché, a consacré le meilleur de lui-même à un sport de choix réservé à une élite, et au folklore de son pays.

La dernière flèche qu'il vient de tirer victorieusement est celle qu'il a décochée au C. I. O. pour obtenir la réintroduction du tir à l'arc au programme des Jeux Olympiques, où il figura autrefois. Cette flèche-là vient de faire magnifiquement »mouche».

Champion of the World

The XVIIth World Championships in Prague made history in at least two outstanding ways: it was the first time the new FITA Round was shot at a World Championship; and it was the first time both Champions were from the same Nation—not only both Champions but in fact the first three Ladies and the first three Gentlemen and of course both Champion Teams: an outstanding success.

Competitors, Captains and Delegates from 15 Nations arrived in Prague by air, rail and road and were received and helped by two charming but already on the first day overworked interpreters!

Wednesday July 17th was practice day for the competitors and the First Session of the FITA Congress was held (the Minutes of Congress will be found elsewhere in this Bulletin). This was preceded by an official luncheon for Delegates at the Savarin Club.

The official opening of the XVIIth World Championships on Thursday was an impressive ceremony which took place at 9 o'clock at the Dynamo Stadium starting with a fanfare specially composed for the occasion, and then the twelve competing Nations marched into the arena behind their National flags. There were opening speeches in Czech, French and English by the Czechoslovakian Archery Chairman Mr. J. Bastár and the FITA Vice-President (now President) Mr. Oscar Kessels after which the Teams headed by their Captains marched out again.

This set the scene for four days intensive shooting. The ground was beautifully laid out with large scoreboards, numbers and all ground equipment perfect.

To give a picture in writing of the fight that went on is very difficult. It was soon obvious on both the ladies and gentlemens lines that the six Americans were taking the leading places!

But the standard of shooting was very high and practically all competing Nations must have been proud of the scores put up by their competitors. You can all study the individual scores at the end of this Bulletin, but let me draw your attention to just how intense the struggle was. At 30 m no less than 16 gentlemen (representing 7 Nations) scored over 600; and 23 (representing 8 Nations out of 12 competing) scored over 300 on a single round. Every arrow was important. The top scorer averaged 27 points an end, at 30 m but with an average of 25 points an end the place was 17th and with an average of 23 points an end the place rushed down to 43rd!

With so many nearly equal archers it wasn't just a fight in actual shooting BUT a mental battle which is harder to fight always and of which the majority have so very little practice at that level.

The weather on Thursday and Friday was perfect for shooting; Saturday it rained heavily, Sunday was fine but with gusty winds.

Although only 6 dozen arrows were shot every day, so careful and deliberate was the shooting, as of course it must be when the standard is so high, that they were full days with little time for nothing much else. On two days we left at 8 o'clock and returned at 4 o'clock—for lunch! The other two days we had lunch at 11 o'clock, left hotel at 12 o'clock and returned between 6 and 7 o'clock.

There was a good public attendance willing to cheer and loudspeakers were in use throughout except when competitors were on the shooting line.

On the Friday morning before shooting there was an organized sightseeing tour of Prague, seeing some of the lovely buildings and bridges and charming streets.

On the Saturday morning a breakfast reception was given at the beautiful old Town Hall for the Congress Delegates over which the Vice Lord Mayor of Prague presided. We were all presented with a book and a badge.

The closing ceremony was again impressive and very moving. 1st, 2nd and 3rd (both in ladies and gentlemen) were Americans. What a proud moment for them, when they were all on the rostrum and their National Anthem was played.

On Monday there was a whole day excursion to the 12th century old castle at Karlstein occupying a magnificent position on top of a hill—and Congress had its second session on that day.

In the evening there was prizegiving, followed by dinner, films and dancing. Beside the Champions Challenge Trophies and all the medals to individuals and teams, beautiful prizes in cut crystal were presented in great numbers.

Competing Teams made presentations to the Czechoslovakian Archery Section with their thanks for the perfect way they had organized the World Championship.

The filmshow was a surprise to us all, we were first shown a Finnish film from the 1955 World Championship in Helsinki, and then a wonderful colour film of the Championship just ended.

On Tuesday it rained when we all left Prague behind for our respective homecountries after eventful days, many of which we will never forget.

And looking ahead we cannot but wonder WHEN will the new World Championship Records be broken?

La Fédération hongroise avait délégué Mr. Fabian, comme observateur.

Mr. Oscar Kessels, Vice-Président et Mr. Lars Ekegren, Secrétaire-Général de la FITA étaient également présents.

II. Faculté de participer au Championnat du Monde de Tir à l'Arc 1957

En l'absence de Mr. Torsten Fahlman, le Trésorier de la FITA, le Secrétaire-Général rapportait que — d'après le compte rendu du Trésorier — les Fédérations suivantes n'avaient pas payé leur cotisation annuelle de 200 Cour. Suéd.:

Indes — Mexique — Espagne et la Turquie (n'avait payé que 100 Cour. Suéd.).

Mr. Fagoaga faisait part aux délégués que l'Espagne avait payé entretemps. Le Congrès constatait que toutes les nations présentes étaient admises à participer au Tournoi du Championnat du Monde de 1957 et que le Trésorier de la FITA réclamait les cotisations arriérées.

III. Affiliation de Nouvelles Fédérations de Tir à l'Arc

Le Secrétaire-Général rapportait que la Fédération hongroise avait formellement demandé son affiliation et qu'elle avait remplie toutes les conditions.

La demande de la Hongrie était acceptée à l'unanimité.

Au nom de sa Fédération, Mr. Fabian, exprimait sa haute reconnaissance et donnait un bref résumé de l'histoire du tir à l'arc en Hongrie.

IV. Vérification des cibles pendant le tir

Une proposition norvégienne était ainsi acceptée:

Flèches laissées dans les cibles.

Il est du devoir du directeur du tir de vérifier qu'aucune flèche n'est restée dans les cibles avant que le signal de tir soit donné. Au besoin le directeur du tir devra pouvoir disposer d'un nombre suffisant d'assistants pour ce contrôle.

Si le directeur du tir donne le signal de tir et que des flèches se trouvent encore dans les cibles, le tir ne peut pas être arrêté ou interrompu.

L'Archer propriétaire de ces flèches peut:

The Hungarian Archery Association had sent M. Fabian as an Observer.

Mr. Oscar Kessels, Vice President of FITA, and Mr. Lars Ekegren, General Secretary of FITA, were also present.

In the absence of Mr. Henry Kjellson, President of FITA, M. Kessels confirmed that the qualified representatives present were all entitled to vote, and opened the Meeting of the XVIIIth International Archery Congress.

The Memory of the late M. Alberto Maria Bravo, President of the Portuguese Archery Association, was specially honoured before taking up the next question of the Agenda.

II. Qualification for competing in the World Championship Tournament of 1957

In the absence of Mr. Torsten Fahlman, the FITA Treasurer, the General Secretary reported that—according to the Treasurer's Report—the following National Archery Associations had not paid their annual fee of Swedish Crowns 200:

India, Mexico, Spain and Turkey (Swedish Crowns 100 only).

M. Fagoaga told the delegates that Spain had paid in the meantime.

Congress stated that all present Nations were entitled to compete in the World Championship Tournament of 1957, and that the FITA Treasurer should ask again for the outstanding fees.

III. Affiliation of new Archery Association

The General Secretary reported that the Hungarian Archery Association had formally asked for affiliation, and that all conditions had been fulfilled.

The application from Hungary was unanimously approved.

On behalf of his Association, Mr. Fabian expressed his deep gratitude to the Delegates, and gave a short account of the Hungarian archery history.

IV. Control of targets during the shooting

A Norwegian motion was unanimously accepted as follows:

Arrows left in the targets.

It is the duty of the Director of the Shooting to ensure that no arrows are left in the targets before any signal for shooting is given. When necessary, the Director of the Shooting must have sufficient assistance for such control.

Should the Director of the Shooting inadvertently give the signal for shooting although there are arrows left in the targets, the shooting must not be stopped or interrupted. The archer to whom such arrows belong can then

- either shoot with other arrows instead of the forgotten ones; the CT must be immediately informed and participate in the subsequent marking checking; the forgotten arrows must be

Si un archer oublie ses flèches sur le terrain dans le secteur de la cible; ceci ne tombe pas sous la responsabilité du directeur du tir et cet archer n'aura aucun droit à être compensé en lui permettant de tirer après la fin normale de la distance dont question. Dans ce cas, toutefois, l'archer peut tirer les séries suivantes avec d'autres flèches mais devra en informer la commission technique avant que le pointage ait lieu.

Mr. Bolberg, USSR et Mr. Skoric, Yougoslavie, assistaient comme observateurs. XI. Elections

a) FITA — Président 1957—1961

checked with the score-card, and must under no circumstances be touched or removed until the marking of the new series has been made;

- b) or—if allowed by the CT—be compensated by being permitted to shoot the same number of arrows as forgotten, as soon as the other archers have finished the distance in question.

Arrows left on the ground

Should an archer forget his arrows on the ground in the target area, this does not fall under the responsibility of the Director of the Shooting, and the archer will then have no right to be compensated by being permitted to shoot after the normal finish of the distance in question. In this case, however, the archer can shoot the next series with other arrows and inform the CT before the marking takes place.

V. The World Championship Tournament of 1957

The Czechoslovakian Organizing Committee reported on the arrangements for the World Championship Tournament of 1957. The Team Captains had elected the following CT: Dr. Jan Dobias, Czechoslovakia, President, Mr. Yngve Bluhme, Sweden, and M. José de Fagoaga Laguna, Spain.

M. Bolberg, USSR, and M. Skoric, Yougoslavie, were present as Observers. M. Kessels greeted them specially, after which M. Bolberg—who represented the USSR Olympic Committee—made a short speech. He hoped that his country would be represented as a Member of FITA by 1958. The General Secretary was also present.

VII. Minutes of the FITA Congress of 1955 and the Administrative Council Meeting of 1956

The General Secretary reported that the Congress Minutes had been printed in the "Bulletin Officiel" No. 15, and that the Council Minutes had been distributed to all Affiliated Associations, and to the Members of the FITA Administrative Council.

Both Minutes were unanimously accepted, and Congress confirmed all decisions made at the Council Meeting.

VIII. Report of the President

The General Secretary reported that the Report of the President had been distributed to everybody concerned. The Report was unanimously accepted.

IX. Financial Report for 1955—1957

The Treasurer's Financial Report for 1955—1957, which had been separately distributed, was unanimously accepted.

X. Report of the CT

Mr. Dobias read the Report of the CT, which was unanimously accepted. M. Kessels expressed the gratitude of all participants to the CT, and to all Members of the World Championships Organization.

XI. Elections

a) FITA President 1957—1961

Two candidates were nominated, Mr. Henry Kjellson, Sweden,

Suède et Mr. Oscar Kessels, Belgique. Le vote avait lieu par scrutin secret et Mr. Kessels était élu.

Mr. Kessels prononçait un discours exprimant sa gratitude pour la confiance lui témoignée. Des félicitations lui étaient adressées par télégramme.

b) *Vice-Président FITA 1957—1961, succédant à Mr. Nettleton*

Le Congrès élut à l'unanimité Mrs. Inger Frith, Grande-Bretagne, qui exprimait sa gratitude, étant la première femme occupant cette fonction prominente.

c) *Secrétaire-Général FITA 1957—1961*

Le Secrétaire-Général donnait sa démission afin de permettre au nouveau Président de proposer un nouveau Secrétaire-Général dans son propre pays. Le président, cependant demandait au Secrétaire-Général de rester en fonction. Aucun autre candidat était présent et le Secrétaire-Général était réélu à l'unanimité.

d) *Trésorier FITA 1957—1961*

Le trésorier démissionnait également mais était invité à continuer son activité et était ensuite réélu à l'unanimité.

e) *Autres membres du Conseil d'Administration FITA 1957—1961*

La période de session s'achevait pour Messieurs A. J. Barter, Australie, Axel Poulsen, Danemark, José de Fagoaga Laguna, Espagne et Antti Hiekamies, Finlande. Leur réélection était proposée, les autres candidats étaient Mr. Thube, Indes, Mr. Ansala, Finlande et Mr. Schindler, Suisse.

Cinq sièges devaient être occupés. Le vote avait lieu par balottage secret. Messieurs Barter, Poulsen, Fagoaga, Hiekamies et Schindler étaient élus.

Parmi les autres membres du Conseil d'Administration, deux membres devaient être élus comme Vice-Président, Mr. Poulsen, était réélu à l'unanimité, ensuite eu lieu un vote secret. Mrs. Jean Richards-Burri était élue à la majorité des voix. Un télégramme de félicitations était envoyé.

Le contrôle des votes était effectué par Mme B. Schmidt et le Dr. Dobias.

En corrélation avec la proposition belge N° I., qui était retirée, le Congrès adoptait la modification suivante de l'Art. 9. des Statuts de la FITA:

Le siège de la FITA est fixé au domicile du Président de la FITA et/ou du Secrétaire-Général de la FITA.

Après cette modification le nouveau Président proposait qu'à l'avenir la correspondance officielle devrait être adressée au Secrétaire-Général, ce qui était accepté à l'unanimité.

XII. Nouveau règlement pour la Série FITA

Suite à des propositions de la Nouvelle-Zélande et de la Finlande, le Congrès prenait la décision suivante:

Les Records du Monde peuvent être battus en tirant une simple Série FITA en une ou deux journées (comme aux tournois de Championnat du Monde).

Une liste officielle des Records du Monde serait distribuée par le Secrétaire-Général, aussitôt qu'il serait en possession des résultats officiels du Tournoi de Prague de 1957. Les nouveaux records du Monde seront ensuite homologués conformément au Règlement, publié dans l'Information FITA 2/1957 (mars).

Si la série FITA et des séries d'autre type sont tirés le même jour, la Série FITA devra être tirée en premier lieu.

Lors des tirs pour l'écusson international d'Archer Méritoire ("FITA Star Archers") la Série FITA peut être tirée en un ou deux jours. Le règlement pour cet écusson (en date du 13 avril 1957) était accepté à l'unanimité et un modèle de l'écusson était exposé.

XIII. Nouveau règlement pour la participation aux Tournois de Championnat du Monde

Une proposition finlandaise au sujet d'un Nouveau règlement pour la participation aux Championnats du Monde n'était pas acceptée.

XIV. Obligations de la Commission Technique

Faisant suite à une proposition finlandaise, le Congrès invitait toutes les Fédérations affiliées de soumettre leurs suggestions concernant les obligations de la Commission Technique avant le 1er janvier 1958.

XV. Période pour les Tournois de Championnat du Monde

Faisant suite à une proposition suédoise, le Congrès décidait que chaque nation désignée à organiser un tournoi de Championnat du Monde devra proposer une période raisonnable pour le tournoi, au Congrès FITA, pour approbation finale.

XVI. Plaquette en or pour S. M. le Roi Baudouin de Belgique

Le Congrès a décidé à l'unanimité d'octroyer à S. M. le Roi Baudouin de Belgique la Plaquette en Or pour mérites Internationaux.

and M. Oscar Kessels, Belgium. Voting took place by secret ballot, and M. Kessels was elected.

M. Kessels made a speech, in which he expressed his deep gratitude. He also thanked Mr. Kjellson for all he had done for the Federation, and suggested that Mr. Kjellson should be appointed Honorary President, which was unanimously accepted. Congratulations were forwarded by telegram.

b) *FITA Vice President 1957—1959 after Mr. Nettleton*

Congress unanimously elected Mrs. Inger Frith, Great Britain, who expressed her gratitude to be the first lady holding this high position.

c) *FITA General Secretary 1957—1961*

The General Secretary resigned, in order to make it possible for the new President to suggest a new General Secretary from his own country. The President, however, asked the General Secretary to stay. No other candidate was mentioned, and the General Secretary was unanimously re-elected.

d) *FITA Treasurer 1957—1961*

Also the Treasurer resigned, but was asked to continue and was unanimously re-elected.

e) *Other Members of the FITA Administrative Council 1957—1961*

Term was up for Messrs. A. J. Barter, Australia, Axel Poulsen, Denmark, José de Fagoaga Laguna, Spain, and Antti Hiekamies, Finland. Re-election was suggested for them all, and other candidates were Mr. Thube, India, Mr. Ansala, Finland, and Mr. Schindler, Switzerland.

Five vacancies had to be filled, and voting took place by secret ballot. Messrs. Barter, Poulsen, Fagoaga, Hiekamies and Schindler were elected.

Out of the other Members of the FITA Council, two Members had to be elected *FITA Vice Presidents*. Mr. Poulsen was unanimously re-elected, after which an election by secret ballot took place. Mrs. Jean Richards-Burri was elected by a majority of votes. She was congratulated by telegram.

The votes were scrutinized by Mrs. Schmidt and Dr. Dobias.

In connection with the Belgian Motion No. 1, which was withdrawn, Congress made the following change to Art. 9 of the FITA Statutes:

"The residences of the President of FITA and/or the General Secretary of FITA is (are) established as the Headquarters of the International Federation."

After this change the new President suggested that all official letters should be sent to the General Secretary in the future, which was unanimously accepted.

XII. New Rules for the FITA Round

Answering motions from Finland and New Zealand, Congress decided as follows:

World Records can be beaten when shooting the single FITA Round in one or two days (as in the World Championship Tournaments).

An official list of the World Records shall be distributed by the General Secretary, as soon as he receives the official results from the Prague Tournament of 1957. New World Records will then be recognized in accordance with the Rules, stated in the FITA INFORMATION 2/1957 (March).

If the FITA Round and any other Round are shot on the same day, the FITA Round must be shot first.

Also when shooting for the International Badge for Merited Archers (the "FITA Star Archers") the FITA Round can be shot in one or two days. The Rules for this Badge (dated April 13th, 1957) were unanimously accepted, and a proof of the badge was shown.

XIII. New Rules for participation in World Championship Tournaments

A Finnish motion about new Rules for participation in World Championship Tournaments was not accepted.

XIV. The duties of the Commission Technique

In connection with a Finnish motion, Congress invited all Member Associations to send in their suggestions as to the duties of the Commission Technique before January 1st, 1958.

XV. The date of the World Championship Tournaments

In connection with a Swedish motion, Congress decided that each Nation, appointed to arrange a World Championship Tournament, shall suggest a reasonable dates for the Tournament to the FITA Congress, for final approval.

XVI. Gilt Plaquette to H. M. King Baudouin of Belgium

Congress unanimously decided to invite H. M. King Baudouin of Belgium to accept its Gilt Plaquette for International Merits.

XVII. Tournoi de Championnat du Monde 1959

La Fédération Suédoise était acceptée à l'unanimité comme organisatrice du Tournoi de Championnat du Monde de 1959. Suivant la tradition d'avantguerre le Président proposait la capitale de Suède comme lieu pour ce Tournoi, tout en laissant la décision finale aux organisateurs suédois.

XVIII. Longue et Courte Série FITA

Une proposition britannique concernant une dénomination spéciale pour les deux courtes distances était retirée.

XIX. Les Challenges FITA

Le Congrès décida de conserver uniquement deux Challenges et de restituer les autres aux donateurs. Les deux prix maintenus sont décrits au Bulletin Officiel respectivement comme N° 4 et N° 5. Ils sont destinés aux deux gagnants individuels au Grand Total et ne pourront jamais être gagnés en une seule fois.

Toutes les nations détentrices des autres Challenges étaient invitées à retourner ceux-ci dans le plus bref délai à la Fédération Nationale du pays où le donateur est domicilié. Cette fédération se chargera ensuite de le remettre au donateur.

On s'attend à ce que désormais les organisateurs des Championnats du Monde donneront des prix individuels pour les résultats au Grand Total.

XX. Développement futur de la FITA

Le Congrès décida de constituer une Commission spéciale, ayant comme tâche d'étudier et de proposer toute autre forme de tir à l'arc en dehors du tir à l'arc sur cible, pour laquelle des compétitions internationales pourraient être mises au point par la FITA. Le premier rapport sera soumis au Congrès FITA l'année prochaine.

Les membres de cette Commission sont: Mr. Kessels, Belgique, Président, Mr. Marvin Schmidt, USA, Mr. Håkan Blechingberg, Suède, Mr. C. B. Edwards, Grande-Bretagne et Mr. Jiri Bastar, Tchéco-Slovaquie.

XXI. Juges internationaux

Une proposition tchéco-slovaque concernant des juges internationaux n'était pas acceptée.

XXII. Cotisation annuelle

Le Congrès décida que la cotisation restera fixée comme précédemment à 200.— Cour. Suédoises.

XXIII. Questions diverses

a) Pourra-t-on autoriser tous les types de viseurs?

Le Congrès discutait la question si la FITA pourrait autoriser l'emploi de tous les types de viseurs, afin de faciliter la tâche de la Commission Technique. Des propositions des Fédérations affiliées sont sollicitées avant le 1er janvier 1958.

b) Quel matériel est utilisé?

Les organisateurs du tournoi de Prague promettaient de publier une liste complète du matériel (arcs, flèches et points de repère) utilisés lors du Tournoi, à envoyer à toutes les Fédérations affiliées.

c) Assurance

L'assurance des deux Challenges restants serait à couvrir par la FITA.

d) Impression des Statuts et du Règlement

Le Congrès décida que les Statuts et le Règlement FITA devront être ré-imprimés le plus tôt possible.

e) Peut-on essayer un arc sur le pas de tir

Le Règlement n'étant pas clair à ce sujet, le Secrétaire-Général était invité à préparer une suggestion pour le Congrès de l'année prochaine.

f) Plaquettes en argent pour Frantisek Hadas

Conformément à une proposition de l'ancien Comité Exécutif de la FITA le Congrès décida à l'unanimité d'attribuer sa plaque en Argent pour Mérites Internationaux à Frantisek Hadas.

g) Mr. Kessels adressait des remerciements à tous les participants et plus particulièrement au Secrétaire-Général.

XVII. The World Championship Tournament of 1959

The Swedish Archery Association was unanimously accepted as the Organizer of the 1959 World Championship Tournament. In accordance with post-war tradition the President suggested the Capital of Sweden as the place for the Tournament, but left the decision open to the Swedish arrangers.

XVIII. "Long" and "Short" FITA distances

A British motion about a special name for the two shorter FITA distances was withdrawn.

XIX. The FITA Challenge Prizes

Congress decided to keep only two Challenge Prizes, and to give all the rest back to the Donors. The two to be kept are described as No. 4 and No. 5, respectively, in the "Bulletin Officiel". They are for the two individual Winners, Grand Total, and they can never be won outright.

Nations holding the other Challenge Prizes were asked to send these Prizes back to the National Archery Association in the country of the Donor without any delay. The Association will then forward the Prize to the Donor.

In the future the World Championship Tournament Organizers are expected to give individual prizes to be kept by the winner, and only for the Grand Total Scores.

XX. The future development of FITA

Congress decided to form a special Committee, the task of which should be to study and suggest what kinds of archery other than Target Archery could be taken up for international competitions by FITA. The first Report shall be given to next year's FITA Congress.

Members of the Committee are: M. Kessels, Belgium, Chairman, Mr. Marvin Schmidt, USA, Mr. Håkan Blechingberg, Sweden, Mr. C. B. Edwards, Great Britain, and Mr. Jiri Bastar, Czechoslovakia.

XXI. International Judges

A Czechoslovakian motion about International Judges was not accepted.

XXII. Annual Fee

Congress decided that the Annual Fee should be as before, i.e. Swedish Crowns 200.

XXIII. Sundry Questions

a) Can pin-sights be standardized?

Congress discussed whether FITA could authorize a limited number of "standard pin-sights", in order to facilitate the work of the "CT". Suggestions are expected from the Affiliated Associations before January 1st, 1958.

b) What equipment is being used?

The Organizers of the Prague Tournament promised to send out a complete list of the equipment (bows, arrows and pin-sights) which had been used during the Tournament to all Affiliated Associations.

c) Insurance

The two remaining Challenge Prizes have to be insured by FITA.

d) Printing of Statutes and Rules

Congress decided that the FITA Statutes and Shooting Rules should be reprinted as soon as possible.

e) Could a bow be tried on the shooting-line?

As the Rules (Art. 34 and 35) are not clear in this respect, the General Secretary was asked to make a suggestion to next year's Congress.

f) Silver Plaque to Frantisek Hadas

In accordance with the suggestion of the retiring FITA Executive Committee, Congress unanimously decided to give Frantisek Hadas, Czechoslovakia, its Silver Plaque for International Merits.

g) Mr. Kessels expressed his gratitude to all those present, and specially to the General Secretary.

APPENDIX 1

Report of the President

Archery is growing, all over the world. Since my latest report Canada, Cuba, Germany, India, Luxembourg, Turkey and Venezuela have been affiliated, and more countries can be expected to join us in 1957.

Italy is a special problem, when thinking of the Olympic Games in Rome in 1960. If we can get a strong Italian Archery Association started now, we shall have an opportunity of becoming re-introduced as an optional Olympic Sport at that time. The Italian Shooting Association seems to be interested in starting a special Archery Section. Let us hope for the best.

The XVIIth World Championship Tournament took place in Helsinki on July 19–22, 1955. The total number of competitors was 89, representing the following Nations:

Katarzyna Wisniewska, Poland, won the ladies' competition, scoring 3033 p. Second was Joyce Warner, Great Britain, scoring 2986 p, and third Impi Hartikainen, Finland, scoring 2969 p.

Nils Andersson, Sweden, won among the gentlemen, scoring 3020 p. Second was Robert Rhode, USA, scoring 2987 p, and third Bertil Olsson, Sweden, scoring 2848 p.

The team competitions were won by Great Britain (Ladies), scoring 8679 p, and by Sweden (Gentlemen), scoring 8697 p. The British Lady Team noted three Team World Records.

Also three Individual World Records were beaten. At the 35 m distance, Bertil Olsson, Sweden, noted 504 p, and at the double short round both Nils Andersson and Bertil Olsson, Sweden, noted 1479 p. Strange enough, both of them had 748 p on the second day, and 731 p on the fourth day of shooting.

The Tournament took place close to the Olympic Stadium. The arrangements were absolutely perfect, a revolutionary new marking method was tested, and a very good speaker gave the results in different languages.

As usual, the Banquet gave an extra glamour to the arrangements. It took place at the Brändö Casino Restaurant, just outside Helsinki. After the distribution of Prizes, the FITA Plaquettes for International Merits (Gilt) were given to the following persons: M. Paul Demare, France, Mr. Lars Ekegren, Sweden, Mr. Sixten von Hofsten, Sweden, M. Oscar Kessels, Belgium, Mr. Henry Kjellson, Sweden, and Mr. C. W. Nettleton, Great Britain.

I thank the Finnish arrangers from all participants for this impressing and in all respects perfect Tournament. We all felt like honoured guests among very good friends.

During our stay in Helsinki, flowers were laid on the graves of Field Marshal Mannerheim and of the Unknown Soldier by General Tapola, Chairman of the Finnish Archery Association, and by the FITA President.

The 4th FITA Mail-Match was arranged in 1956, for the first time on a Single FITA Round, shot in one day. No less than 100 ladies and 181 gentlemen from all over the world took part, which is a new record. Winner among the gentlemen was W. J. Burton, New Zealand, scoring 1080 p. He was followed by J. Van den Bosch, Belgium, 1054 p, and J. Le Roux, South Africa, 1048 p.

Ladies' Winner was J. Warner, Great Britain, scoring 953 p, followed by C. Holland, South Africa, 904 p, and M. Cugowska, Poland, 885 p.

Team Winner among the ladies was Great Britain, 2670 p, and among the gentlemen Belgium, 3055 p.

We are still working hard on the re-introduction of archery as an optional Olympic Sport.

At the FITA Congress in Helsinki in 1955 it was decided that the FITA Administrative Council should meet in Stockholm in 1956, in order to decide about some important questions. The Minutes of this Meeting have already been distributed to all Affiliated Associations. The Stockholm Meeting decided about the organization of future World Championship Tournaments, about titles, records and medals, among other things. The Challenge Prize question will be discussed once more at the Prague Congress in 1957.

APPENDIX 2

REPORT BY THE TECHNICAL COMMISSION

of the XVIIIth World Championship Tournament

The CT, composed by Mr. Jan Dobiás, Czechoslovakia, Yngve Bluhme, Sweden, and José de Fagoaga Laguna, Spain, settled in place immediately after its election.

The CT stated that already the day reserved for the training the shooting place was perfectly safe as from the point of view of the competitors as well as to the presumes for shield of the tackle.

The length of all the shooting distances has been measured over and each target was checked as to its accordance with numbers mentioned in the Article 23 of the Statutes, and thus was proceeded during the whole tournament, when the targets had to be changed. Changing of the target was requested by the CT whenever it was damaged especially during the rainy weather.

All tackle of every competitor was examined before the beginning of the tournament and at any time a competitor was obliged to change his tackle during the shooting.

The CT cared of a quick course of the tournament. This was facilitated by the manner of marking the hits on the targets and also by the fact that the scoringmen were experienced archers wearing a special dress.

The captains of the teams consented that the marking at the 30 m distance should be done only when all three rows of competitors had shot their arrows. After this good experience the CT suggests to modify the Article 28 of Statutes in this way.

Beside some small matters settled everytimes at once after the advice of the captain of the team concerned the Tournament went on fluently, all the Rules and Regulations were strictly observed.

A dispute arose when before the beginning of the Tournament the CT warned some competitors that Article 35 of Statutes does not allow to sight or draw the bow with or without an arrow except on the shooting point. The CT referred to the practice that the drawing of bows on the shooting point is allowed during the shooting only. As to this point the CT suggests to complete the Article 35 of Statutes.

Besides of this the CT has unanimously consented that the Tournament was splendidly organized by help of most modern technical arrangements and the CT thanks the Organizing Association for this excellent Tournament which no one of the competitors and the numerous spectators will ever forget.

The CT also expresses sincere appreciation to all competitors for their good sport and for their faultless discipline.

During the Tournament no protest was entered and therefore the CT suggests that the Congress should confirm the results achieved in the XVIIth World Championship Tournament.

Minutes of the FITA Administrative Council Session

at the Hotell Gillet, Stockholm, Sweden, on October 7th, 1956

1. Opening of Session

The President opened the Session at 11.10 a.m., and greeted all present Members of the FITA Council heartily welcome.

2. Call-over of names

At the call-over of names, the following list of votes was accepted:

3. Admission of new National Archery Association

The General Secretary reported that the "Deutscher Schützenbund e. V." had officially asked for affiliation on May 17th, 1956, and that the first fee of Swedish Crowns 200 had been paid. The German Association was unanimously accepted as a Member of FITA.

4. The World Records

In accordance with the President's voting-plan the Session decided that the following World Records shall be noted from now on:

Individual Records

At World Championships, International Tournaments and National Championships: each Distance and Grand Total, single FITA Round.

Team Records

Only at World Championships and International Tournaments: Grand Total, single FITA Round.

5. The World Championships Records

The following World Championships Records are going to be noted from the next World Championships on:

Individual Records

Each Distance and Grand Total, double FITA Round.

Team Records

Only Grand Total, double FITA Round.

6. The World Championships Titles

After a long discussion the following compromise was accepted:

Individual Titles

"Champion of the World" and "Lady Champion of the World" to be the Titles for the Winners Grand Total, double round. As to the Titles of the Winners at each Distance, double round, it will be up to each Nation to find suitable names in accordance with its language. If possible should not the words "World Champion" be used in these titles, but if used they should always be mentioned in combination with the name of the distance in question. These national names shall be recorded by the General Secretary.

Team Titles

"Team Champion of the World" and "Lady Team Champion of the World" to be the Titles for the Winners Grand Total, double round. No other Titles to be used.

7. The FITA Challenge Prizes

The old Prizes and the future Prizes were discussed, and the following decisions were made:

Old Prizes

No more eternal Challenge Prizes. The Donors shall be asked to permit the FITA Council to decide in which way the Prizes should be given to the archers—if this permission will not be given, the Prizes shall be sent back to the Donors.

New Prizes

New Prizes can be accepted by the FITA Council. Then the Statutes are as follows:

For Individual Prizes and for Team Prizes

Grand Total: to be won after two victories.

The Distances: to be won after two or three victories—the alternative to be accepted by the FITA Council.

A combination of Distances, less than the Grand Total: same Statutes as for the Distances.

8. The Medals for World Championships

The following decisions were made about the Medals for World Championships:

Individual Medals

The big Gilt, Silver and Bronze Medals with a wreath (same as in Helsinki in 1955, with a national ribbon) to be used for the best three archers Grand Total, double round. Smaller Gilt, Silver and Bronze Medals without a wreath for the best three archers at each Distance, double round.

Team Medals

Three small Gilt, Silver and Bronze Medals without a wreath to the Members of the first, second and third Teams, Grand Total, double round. No Distance Medals.

9. The FITA Banners

It was decided that no Banners should be made for winning Teams.

Mr. Antti Hiekkamies, Finland, will present an offer of a FITA flag, to be hoisted at World Championships Tournaments.

10. International Judges

Council Session decided to postpone the decision about International Judges until the next FITA Congress. The Council Members will study the problem, and a recommendation will then be given before the Congress Meeting.

11. Honorary Vice-President

The President reported that Mr. C. W. Nettleton, Great Britain, had expressed a wish to withdraw from the FITA Council, because of considerations of health. In accordance with the FITA Statutes, Great Britain had filled his place as a Vice-President in the FITA Council with Mrs. Inger Frith, Great Britain, the choice to be submitted the next Congress Meeting for confirmation.

Mr. Nettleton was unanimously proclaimed Honorary Vice-President for lifetime, and a telegram was sent to him.

12. Sundry Questions

- a) M. Kessels, Belgium, reported that the International Olympic Committee is planning a new Meeting on June 5th—8th, 1957. A new application for the re-introduction of Archery as an Optional Olympic Sport will be written by the President and the General Secretary.
- b) A special rate of exchange will be arranged for the World Championship Tournament in Praha next year. Czechoslovakia will give further news well before the competition.
- c) M. Kessels, Belgium, expressed the gratitude of those present to the President and the General Secretary, and complimented the General Secretary specially for the "Bulletin" No. 15.

13. Closing of Session

The President thanked everybody for a very interesting Session and declared the 1956 Administrative Council Session closed at 5.30 p.m.

Important Message

In order to honour the best archers in the world, the FITA Executive Committee has decided to institute an *International Badge for Merited Archers*, to be taken from 1957 on. The Rules are as follows:

1. The Archer shall have reached at least 1000 points in a National or International Competition announced to take place. Type of Competition: a Single FITA Round, shot in one or two days.
2. The Badge can be taken by Ladies as well as Gentlemen.
3. The Archer has to be a Member of a Club, connected with a National Archery Association, which is affiliated to FITA.
4. Scores entitling to the Badge have to be sent to the National Archery Association of the Country in question. (You can send in the original scores or a witnessed copy of the original scores.) The Association then sends the material to the General Secretary of FITA, together with a written declaration, stating that:

- a) the Archer belongs to a Club, connected with the Association;
 - b) the Competition was National or International and announced to take place;
 - c) the Competition was shot in accordance with point 1 above.
5. At the same time a Badge Fee of Swedish Crowns 10 for each Badge has to be sent to the FITA Treasurer, Mr. Torsten Fahlgren, Stureparken 7, Stockholm, Sweden.
 6. After this the Badge will be sent to the National Archery Association which ordered it, to be given to the Archer at a Festival Occasion.
