



The XIXth World Championships — Brussels 1958

A record entry of 134 competitors representing 15 nations from three continents took part in the 1958 World Championship in Brussels; the two 1957 World Champions were both present.

This extra World Championship was arranged to coincide with the Brussels World Fair and Exhibition and the Heysel Stadium was adjacent to the Exhibition Ground. This however proved not to be ideal for a World Championship — Helicopters took off and landed continually and the music and noise from the Fair did not help archers to concentrate! We were so near and yet so far from this outstanding World Exhibition: it was practically impossible to find time for even a short visit to get just an impression of all the wonders there, and yet if you asked what was the most outstanding impression of the XIXth World Championship? we would answer: THE ATOMIUM! This Symbol of the Exhibition, to-day at least by picture known throughout the World, was visible from the Stadium as indeed this gigantic structure was from practically anywhere in Brussels.

But five eventful and very full days were spent by the World's best archers in the Stadium. Saturday 19th was practice day, in beautiful warm weather. The shooting line was crowded throughout the day with many familiar faces, also many newcomers to World Championships, some of whose names were however already World known — Miss Corby, U.S.A., and Mrs. Joubert, South Africa, to mention but two. Much interest is taken in equipment on this day; it is the only time competitors really have time to exchange news and views and ask questions. On this day members of the F.I.T.A. Council, on behalf of all archers, placed a wreath on the Unknown Warriors Grave.

The Championship was opened on Sunday 20th July by the Lord Mayor of Brussels, the Ceremony, as always, being very impressive. A heavy shower delayed the start of shooting and a gusty wind made conditions difficult throughout the day — the competitors shelter, built behind the lines was lifted and blown over just as shooting finished! (It was rebuilt and ready again for the 3rd day!) Shooting was good on the whole, but, owing to the weather conditions, not outstanding. All eyes were on the U.S.A. team, wondering whether they would repeat last year's outstanding victory, but although Mrs. Meinhart, the reigning Lady World Champion, and Mr. Caspers both took the lead, they had to fight to keep it for the day.

The second day was again showery and windy and it became very cold. Among the ladies a great fight started between two Swedish ladies, Mrs. Johansson and Mrs. Tengroth, and Miss Corby, Mrs. Meinhart and Miss Sevey of the U.S.A. (it may be added here that both Mrs. Tengroth and Miss Sevey have only been shooting for

about two years!). Among the men the fight was just as keen between Finland, Sweden, U.S.A. and Great Britain (among them an amazing young 16 year old Tim Cantwell, second in the U.S.A. Qualifying Tournament with 1074 + 1094, who eventually finished 5th in World Championship). By the end of the second day it became clear that the U.S.A. were not going to have it all their own way this year.

On the third day it was really interesting to watch. The weather remained unkind with showers and a heavy thunderstorm in the middle of the afternoon. By the end of the day the Swedes Mrs. Johansson and Mr. Thysell had taken the lead.

On the fourth and last day (still cold and showery!) Mrs. Johansson was chased by all three U.S.A. ladies, Miss Corby only just behind. They started the last distance* with Mrs. Johansson only three points ahead of Miss Corby — the distance just finished having given Miss Corby a gain of 21 points on Mrs. Johansson. Tired, but determined they shot arrow for arrow against each other (although both the two other U.S.A. ladies and Mrs. Booyens, South Africa, were making better scores!). Both ladies are very experienced Tournament archers and indeed they needed everything. The victory went to Mrs. Johansson to become 1958 Lady World Champion — but both ladies shot magnificently, they were the only two ladies to make a double 1000, although six ladies passed the 1000 in one of their rounds.

On the mens side the last day started with Mr. Thysell, Sweden, leading, followed by Mr. Casper, U.S.A., 20 points behind, then Mr. Kallionpaa, Finland and Mr. Matthews, Great Britain, 47 and 49 points respectively behind Mr. Casper. Mr. Casper made a poor score at the first distance, but Mr. Matthews and Mr. Kallionpaa both pulled up, Matthews now being second, only 32 points behind and Kallionpaa third. But that was as far as they got; Mr. Thysell went ahead to finish as World Champion — a double victory for Sweden; for the second year both Championships went to the same Nation, which is indeed a remarkable and very proud achievement.

The Closing Ceremony took place immediately after the shooting had finished, the winners one by one mounted the rostrum, 1st, 2nd, 3rd; National Anthems were played, all were presented with bouquets and the two Champions with sashes in the Belgium colours.

On Thursday the Banquet and the Prizegiving took place at 1 o'clock at Hotel Plaza. It was beautifully done and extremely well organised. There were numerous speeches and presentations of gifts to the Royal Belgium Archery Society. The Prize list was outstanding; apart from the F.I.T.A. Challenge Trophies and Medals, there were

two Gold Medals presented by the King, magnificent Silver Cups and Medals from the City of Brussels and a Prize and Diploma for every competitor; it made the winners shine and the less fortunate forget the shadow of disappointment that they had not shot their best.

Throughout the Tournament, the hospitable and untiring Belgium Archers headed by Madame and M. Kessels had been entertaining National Teams every evening after shooting in their historic and beautiful Club St. Sebastian.

The Belgium Arcery Society gave us all an unforgettable week, we left with but one regret: that we could not stay and see more of their beautiful City and Country — and the World Fair!

* The two shorter distances were shot on the first and third days, the two longer on the second and fourth days, so that the last day finished with the two longer distances. Congress during their Session in Brussels passed however a rule whereby this is no longer possible — see new F.I.T.A. Rules elsewhere in this Bulletin.

Welcome to Stockholm!

Minutes of the XIXth International Archery Congress

Brussels, 1958

Part I

At the Stade du Heysel, on the 19th July 1958.

I. Opening of Congress

At the call-over of names, the following qualified representatives answered:

The Moroccan Archery Association had sent M. Sayarh as an Observer.

M. Paul Demare, Honorary President, M. Oscar Kessels, President, and Mr. Lars Ekegren, General Secretary, were also present, as well as some Members of the Administrative Council.

M. Kessels confirmed that the qualified representatives present were all entitled to vote, and opened the Meeting of the XIXth Congress.

II. Qualification for competing in the World Championship Tournament of 1958

In the absence of the Treasurer Mr. Torsten Fahlman, the General Secretary read a statement from Mr. Fahlman, according to which the following National Archery Associations had not paid their annual fee of Swedish Crowns 200: Canada, Cuba and India. As India had not paid for two years, Congress decided to take this matter up for a discussion later on. Congress stated that all Nations present were entitled to compete in the World Championship Tournament of 1958.

III. Affiliation of new Archery Associations

The General Secretary reported that the National Archery Associations of the following three countries had formally asked for affiliation, and that all conditions had been fulfilled: Morocco, Roumania, Japan. The applications were unanimously accepted. M. Kessels congratulated the Observer present from Morocco.

IV. The World Championship Tournament of 1958

On behalf of M. Medaer, President of the Organizing Committee, M. Kessels gave a short description on the arrangements for the 1958 World Championship Tournament. He also reported that the Team Captains had nominated the Technical Commission for the Tournament as follows: M. Gerard, Belgium (President); Mr. Parker, South Africa and M. Baillod, Switzerland.

Great Britain and South Africa queried the Tournament program, which was not arranged in accordance with earlier Congress decisions. Congress decided to accept the Tournament program in its present form, but to bear the query in mind when the Statutes and Shooting Rules are being considered. Records from the Brussels Tournament would be recognized.

II. Faculté de participer au tournoi de Championnat du Monde 1958

En l'absence de Mr. Torsten Fahlman, Trésorier de la F.I.T.A., le Secrétaire-Général donnait lecture d'un rapport de Mr. Fahlman, selon lequel les Fédérations Nationales de Tir à l'Arc suivantes n'avaient pas payé leur cotisation annuelle de 200.— Cour. Suèd.: Canada — Cuba — et l'Inde. L'Inde n'ayant pas payé pendant deux années d'affilée, le Congrès décida de reprendre la discussion de cette question ultérieurement.

Le Congrès constata que toutes les nations présentes étaient admises à participer au Tournoi du Championnat du Monde 1958.

III. Affiliation de Nouvelles Fédérations de Tir à l'Arc

Le Secrétaire-Général rapporta que les Fédérations Nationales de Tir à l'Arc des trois nations suivantes, avaient formellement demandé leur affiliation, et qu'elles avaient rempli toutes les conditions: le Maroc, la Roumanie et le Japon.

Les demandes étaient acceptées à l'unanimité.

M. Kessels congratula l'observateur du Maroc présent.

IV. Championnat du Monde 1958

Au nom de M. Medaer, M. Kessels donna une brève description des arrangements mis au point pour le tournoi de Championnat du Monde 1958. Il rapporta également que la Réunion des Capitaines avait élu la Commission Technique suivante: M. Gérard, Belgique (Président), Mr. Parker (Afrique du Sud) et M. Baillod (Suisse).

La Grande-Bretagne et l'Afrique du Sud firent observer que le programme du tournoi n'était pas conforme aux décisions prises lors des Congrès précédents.

Le Congrès décida d'accepter le programme du tournoi dans sa forme présentée et de reprendre ultérieurement la discussion de la question touchant le programme, en corrélation avec les Statuts et le Règlement de Tir. Les records établis lors du tournoi de Bruxelles seront reconnus.

V. Archery Fanfare

M. Bastar presented the Belgian and the Swedish World Championship organizers with gramophone records of his Archery Fanfare, which was played for the first time at the World Championships in Prague in 1957. The receivers expressed their gratitude and congratulated M. Bastar.

VI. The Stoke Mandeville International Games

Mrs. Frith spoke about the Stoke Mandeville International Games for paralyzed people, where archery is one of the main sports. Congress decided to send a telegram.

VII. Greetings from Mr. Kjellson

M. Kessels read a letter from Mr. Henry Kjellson, Honorary President, in which he sent his best regards. M. Kessels agreed to send a telegram from Congress to Mr. Kjellson.

VIII. Extra Congress Meeting

Congress decided to hold an extra Congress Meeting on Tuesday, July 22nd, at 9 a.m., at the Stade du Heysel. At this Meeting only Statutes and Shooting Rules should be discussed.

The President and the General Secretary were also present, as well as some Members of the Administrative Council.

The President opened the Meeting, which was to discuss article 11 of the Agenda: Statutes and Shooting Rules. The General Secretary spoke about the suggestions and comments made by Member Nations, which had already been distributed to all Member Nations and to the Members of the Administrative Council.

X. Special Committee for Statutes and Rules

The General Secretary suggested the forming of a Special Committee for Statutes and Rules. This was unanimously accepted. Congress thereafter decided as follows:

Basing its work on Congress decisions, this Committee shall prepare a final draft of the Statutes and Rules in English. This draft shall be distributed by December 1958 to all Member Nations, and to Members of the Administrative Council. The Shooting Rules are valid immediately after the distribution of these Minutes; the final draft will only differ as far as drafting and layout are concerned. Definite approval will be given by the 1959 FITA Congress.

Three Committee Members were elected: Mrs. Frith, Great Britain, Mr. Honne, Norway and Mr. Hunter, South Africa. They will elect a Chairman among themselves, the name of this Chairman to be announced at the next Congress Meeting.

XI. General Decisions

It was decided that only such Articles of the Statutes and Rules should be discussed, in which changes had been suggested.

As to the suggestions by Mr. Kjellson, Honorary President of FITA, it was stated that they would not be valid, unless supported by a Member Nation having a recognized vote at the Congress

V. Fanfare des Archers

Le Président ouvrit la séance au cours de laquelle serait discuté le point N° 11 de l'Ordre du Jour: Les Statuts et le Règlement de Tir. Le Secrétaire-Général fit rapport au sujet des propositions et des commentaires, qu'étaient déjà distribués parmi toutes les Nations affiliées et les Membres du Conseil d'Administration.

X. Commission spéciale pour les Statuts et le Règlement

Le Secrétaire-Général proposa la constitution d'une commission spéciale pour les Statuts et le Règlement, ce qui fut accepté à l'unanimité. Ensuite le Congrès décida comme suit:

Basant son travail sur les décisions du Congrès, cette Commission élaborerait en Anglais un projet définitif des Statuts et du Règlement.

Ce projet serait distribué vers le mois de décembre 1958, parmi toutes les nations affiliées et les membres du Conseil d'Administration. Le Règlement de Tir entrerait en vigueur immédiatement après la distribution du Procès-Verbal du Congrès et le projet définitif ne pourrait être modifié que pour autant qu'il s'agirait de questions linguistiques. L'approbation finale interviendrait au Congrès FITA de 1959.

Trois membres de la Commission furent élus: Mrs. Frith, Grande-Bretagne, Mr. Honne, Norvège et Mr. Hunter, Afrique du Sud. Ils élirent un Président entre eux, dont le nom sera annoncé à la prochaine Séance du Congrès.

XI. Décisions Générales

Il était décidé qu'exclusivement seraient discutés à la séance, les articles des Statuts et du Règlement par rapport auxquels des modifications avaient été proposées.

En ce qui concerne les propositions de Mr. Kjellson, Président d'Honneur de la FITA, on stipula qu'elles ne seraient valables pour autant qu'elles seraient appuyées par une nation affiliée, possédant une voix qualifiée à la Séance du Congrès.

Les délégués présents — et particulièrement le groupe suédois — furent sollicités, mais aucun ne désirait donner l'appui demandé.

Meeting. The Delegates present — and especially the Swedish Delegate — were asked, but none would give the support asked for.

Another general decision was that the Constitution and the Shooting Rules should be printed separately; and that the Rules should be divided into General Shooting Rules and World Championships Rules.

XII. Special Decisions

Congress then considered Articles 100—327 (see Appendix).

XIII. The Stoke Mandeville Games

Before ending the Meeting, the President read a draft telegram to the Director of the Stoke Mandeville Games. This was unanimously accepted. A suggestion by Norway to present a Challenge Trophy, incorporating a FITA Medal was also accepted. The General Secretary was instructed to write a letter to the Stoke Mandeville Games about this.

The President opened the Meeting. It was decided that article 11 of the Agenda should only be considered immediately before article 18, Sundry Questions.

XV. Minutes of the FITA Congress of 1957

Article IV, last sentence, was changed to read: "In this case, however, the archer may shoot the next series with other arrows, in which case the CT must be informed in advance."

With this alteration, the Minutes were unanimously accepted.

XVI. Report of the President

The Presidents Report, which had been separately distributed, was unanimously accepted.

XVII. Financial Report for 1957—1958

The Treasurer's Report for 1957—1958 was unanimously accepted. In future Congress wants unpaid annual fees to be shown on the Balance sheet as well as in the Comments.

Since India had not paid the annual fees for two years, Congress decided that an official letter should be written, stating that the fees must be paid before January 1st, 1959, otherwise India should be suspended for the time being, after which the next FITA Congress would take a definite decision.

The President expressed his gratitude to Mr. Fahlman, Treasurer of FITA.

XVIII. President's Proposal about Chartered Accountant

After some discussion the Proposal was withdrawn, as there seemed to be no special need for a Chartered Accountant at the moment.

XVI. Rapport au Président

XVII. Rapport financier 1957—1958

Le Rapport du Trésorier pour la période 1957—1958 fut accepté à l'unanimité. Dorénavant le Congrès désire voir figurer les cotisations arriérées au bilan, et non seulement au commentaire du bilan.

L'Inde, n'ayant pas payé sa cotisation pendant deux années, le Congrès décida de lui adresser une lettre officielle, stipulant que les cotisations devraient être payées avant le 1er janvier 1959. En cas de non paiement, l'Inde serait suspendu provisoirement après quoi le Congrès suivant de la FITA prendrait une décision définitive.

Le Président remercia le Trésorier, Mr. Fahlman.

XVIII. Proposition du Président concernant un expert-comptable

Après une courte discussion, le Président retira sa proposition, vu qu'il n'y paraissait exister un besoin spécial de nommer un expert-comptable pour le moment.

XIX. Report of the Technical Commission

In the absence of the President of the CT, Mr. Parker read a Report from the Technical Commission, which was unanimously accepted (see Appendix). Mr. Kessels expressed his gratitude to the CT and to the Organizers, and congratulated the participants.

XX. Report from the FITA Development Committee

Mr. Lars Ekegren, Vice-President of the FITA Development Committee, reported about the work going on. All Member Nations and Members of the Administrative Council had been consulted, and valuable material had been collected from different parts of the world. He gave reasons suggesting that only Field Archery should be

Congress also accepted Mr. Ekegren's suggestion that a Field Archery Competition should be arranged immediately after next year's World Championship Tournament in Stockholm, in order to demonstrate the new Rules in practice. This competition will be held on August 11, 1959.

Mr. Kessels expressed his gratitude to the Committee.

XXI. An Olympic Report and the Olympic Amateur Rule

The General Secretary reported that Archery had been reintroduced as an Olympic Sport at the IOC Sophia Meeting last year. Unfortunately only men were permitted, and the number of competitors would be restricted to 100. FITA would now take action to get ladies included. As to Olympic Medals, FITA could only expect them for the individual winners, grand total, according to correspondence with the IOC office.

For at least one of the Member Nations, the Olympic Amateur Rule contains a special problem, which has to be solved before writing any Olympic Tournament Rules. A special Committee was formed, consisting of M. Hansen and M. Lefèvre, both from Luxembourg. This Committee shall study the present Amateur Rules among the Member Nations, and suggest a way of action to the next Congress Meeting.

Many speakers underlined that whatever may happen about the Olympic Games, the bi-annual World Championship Tournaments will still be the backbone of all FITA activities.

The General Secretary reported that Archery could not be included in the 1960 Games in Rome. Our first opportunity would therefore be in 1964.

XXII. The FITA Mail-Match

Because of the great number of entries in the latest FITA Mail-Matches, the General Secretary suggested that the National Archery Associations should send in not more than the twelve best results in future. The number of ladies and gentlemen within this group to be decided by each National Association. The suggestion was unanimously accepted.

XXIII. The World Championship Tournaments of 1959 and 1961

Mr. Lars Ekegren, Chairman of the Organizing Committee of the 1959 World Championship Tournament in Stockholm, gave a report on the planned arrangements. After a short discussion about vacation difficulties, planned tournaments etc., the Swedish program was unanimously accepted as follows:

Wednesday, August 5: Training. FITA Congress, part I.
Thursday, August 6: Opening ceremony. Ladies: 70 + 60 m.
Gentlemen: 90 + 70 m.
Friday, August 7: Ladies and Gentlemen: 50 + 30 m.
Saturday, August 8: Ladies: 70 + 60 m. Gentlemen: 90 + 70 m.
Sunday, August 9: Ladies and Gentlemen: 50 + 30 m.
Monday, August 10: FITA Congress, part II. Distribution of prizes. Banquet.

Outside the World Championship Tournament Program:

Tuesday, August 11: International Field Archery Tournament.

As to the 1961 World Championship Tournament, three Member Nations had officially asked to be commissioned to arrange it. These Nations were New Zealand, Switzerland and Norway. After some preliminary discussion, New Zealand withdrew its candidature.

Voting between Switzerland and Norway took place by secret ballot. The votes were scrutinized by Mr. Axel Poulsen and M. Roger Bédard.

Norway won, and Mr. Honne expressed the gratitude of the Norwegian Archery Association. M. Kessels and the Swiss delegate congratulated Norway, and Switzerland asked Congress to remember it for the 1963 World Championships.

Mr. Ekegren welcomed the archers of the world to the 1959 Tournament in Stockholm, and M. Kessels expressed his gratitude, on behalf of FITA.

XIX. Rapport de la Commission Technique

Toutes les nations affiliées et les membres du Conseil d'Administration avaient été consultés et du matériel utile avait été recueilli dans les différentes parties du monde. Il exposa les motifs pour lesquels pour le moment, seulement le tir à l'arc en campagne devrait être adopté par la FITA en tant que nouveau rayon d'activité.

Le Congrès décida à l'unanimité d'adopter le tir à l'arc en campagne, cependant pas comme sport pour les tournois de championnat du Monde ou pour les Jeux Olympiques.

Mr. Ekegren rapporta ensuite au sujet du Règlement International de Tir à l'Arc en campagne, qui était élaboré et distribué par Mr. Håkan Blechingberg, membre suédois de la Commission. Après une brève discussion ce Règlement fut accepté à l'unanimité.

Le Congrès accepta également la proposition de Mr. Ekegren qu'une compétition de tir à l'arc en campagne serait mise sur pied immédiatement après le tournoi du Championnat du Monde à Stockholm en 1959, afin de mettre le nouveau Règlement en pratique. Cette compétition aurait lieu le 11 août 1959.

M. Kessels adressa ses remerciements à la Commission.

XXI. Rapport Olympique

Le Secrétaire-Général rapporta que le tir à l'arc a été réintroduit comme sport olympique au Congrès du C.O.I. de Sofia. Malheureusement les hommes étaient seulement admis et le nombre de compétiteurs limité à 100. La FITA reprendrait maintenant son action en faveur de la participation des dames.

Concernant les médailles olympiques la FITA ne pourrait les espérer que pour les vainqueurs individuels au Grand Total, toutes les distances d'un tournoi étant à additionner, ainsi qu'il résulte de la correspondance avec le Bureau du C.O.I.

Le Règlement olympique amateur provoque un problème spécial pour une des nations affiliées, lequel serait à résoudre avant de pouvoir rédiger le règlement des tournois olympiques. Une commission spéciale fut constituée, composée de M. Hansen et de M. Lefèvre, tous deux de Luxembourg. Cette Commission examinerait le règlement amateur actuel parmi toutes les nations affiliées et soumettrait un plan d'action au prochain Congrès.

De nombreux orateurs soulignèrent que, quoiqu'il pût advenir par rapport à nos futures participations aux Jeux Olympiques, les tournois de championnat du Monde bi-annuels demeuraient la principale des activités de la FITA. XXII. Le Concours FITA par correspondance

The President suggested no change from 200 Swedish Crowns a year. Unanimously accepted.

XXV. The new FITA Statutes and Rules

The Special Committee for Statutes and Rules reported that Mrs. Inger Frith, Great Britain, had been elected Chairman of the Committee.

Congress then considered Articles 328—416. The re-draft of Articles 417—606 was delegated to the Special Committee. (See Appendix).

Miss Weber suggested a special supplement containing security rules, which was unanimously accepted. accepted by FITA as present, as a new branch of activities, but not yet for World Championship Tournaments.

Congress agreed.

Mr. Ekegren then spoke about the International Field Archery Rules, which had been edited and distributed by the Swedish Committee Member, Håkan Blechingberg. After some discussion these Rules were unanimously accepted.

XXVI. Sundry Questions

a) Mr. Poulsen resigns

Mr. Axel Poulsen, Vice-President, announced his intention to resign at the 1959 Congress Meeting, because of illness. M. Kessels expressed his deep regret, and thanked Mr. Poulsen for what he had done for international archery. He also wished him many happy years to come.

b) On behalf of the Member Nations and the Congress Delegates,

M. Béday expressed his gratitudes to the President, the General Secretary and the fellow Delegates.

The Technical Commission was elected on the 19th July 1958 by a Meeting of the Team Captains, and included: M. Gerard, Belgium, Mr. Parker, South Africa, and M. Baillod, Switzerland. President: M. Gerard.

The Commission is satisfied that all the distances were correct, as were the targets used.

An examination of the shooting equipment of competitors was made, and the Technical Commission has no doubt that in every respect it complied with FITA Regulations.

The Commission observed that the method used to mark arrowholes in the targets was both speedy and efficient.

No protests or complaints were received during the shooting, and the highest standard of sportsmanship was shown by the competitors.

Accordingly, the Technical Commission recommends that the Congress confirms the results obtained in the XIXth World Championship Tournament.

APPENDIX 4
PART I CONSTITUTIONOriginal version
(Valid from January 1st, 1959.)

Art. 100 NAME:

The name of the Federation shall be "Fédération Internationale de Tir à l'Arc", and shall be abbreviated "FITA".

Art. 101 OBJECTS:

The objects of FITA shall be: —
 (a) To promote and encourage Archery throughout the World.
 (b) To arrange for the organization of World Championship Tournaments.
 (c) To frame and interpret Rules of Shooting.
 (d) To confirm and maintain a record of Scores at World Championship Tournaments, as well as World Record Scores and World Championship Record Scores.

Art. 102 MEMBERSHIP:

Members shall be National Amateur Archery Associations, one from each affiliated Nation.

Art. 103 AFFILIATION:

(a) National Associations wishing to join FITA must submit a written application for membership, at the same time confirming that the National Association recognizes FITA as the Senior International Federation for Amateur Archery.

Such application must be supported by two Member Associations and must be accompanied by the first Annual Subscription.

(b) Applications for Membership shall be dealt with by Congress, and Congress may decline any application without assigning any reason.

(c) In the event of Congress declining an application for Membership, the An-

nual Subscription remitted shall be refunded.

Art. 104 MANAGEMENT:

There shall be: —

- (a) President;
- Four Vice-Presidents;
- A General Secretary;
- A Treasurer.

The administration and control of the Federation shall be vested in: —

- (a) Congress;
- (b) Administrative Council;
- (c) Executive Committee.

Art. 105 CONGRESS:

(a) Congress shall be the Senior Administrative body of FITA.

(b) Congress shall comprise not more than 3 representatives from each Member Association, together with Members of the Administrative Council.

(c) The President shall preside at all meetings of Congress at which he is present. In the absence of the President, one of the Vice-Presidents, or, if none are present, a Member of the Administrative Council, other than the General Secretary or the Treasurer, shall be elected as Chairman.

(d) Ordinary Sessions of Congress shall be held at the time of every World Championship Tournament, and any Olympic Games which include Archery. The Executive Committee shall convene Extraordinary Sessions of Congress, requisitioned for in writing by at least two thirds of Member Associations.

The notice convening an Extraordinary Session of Congress shall state clearly the object for which the meeting is being called, and the only business which may be transacted at an Extraordinary Session of Congress, shall be

the special business for which such a meeting is called.

(e) Motions for consideration by any Congress may be submitted only by Member Associations or by the President. Motions must reach the General Secretary at least 6 months before Congress meets.

(f) At least 4 months before any Congress meeting, the General Secretary shall collate all Motions and distribute them to all Member Associations, and Members of the Administrative Council.

(g) The Congress Agenda, together with the President's Report, the Treasurer's Report and the Financial Statements, shall be distributed at least 2 months before any ordinary Session of Congress. Such Reports and Financial Statements shall be tabled for adoption by Congress.

(h) Each Member Association shall have one Vote. The Vote of a Member Association may be cast by proxy. Each voting delegate and proxy shall table written authority from the Member Association represented, before the meeting starts.

(i) The President (or Chairman) shall have a casting vote only. Other Members of the Administrative Council shall have no vote unless acting also as properly appointed voting delegates or proxies of Member Associations. Neither the General Secretary nor the Treasurer may serve as voting delegate or proxy.

(j) Amendments to the FITA Constitution or Rules of Shooting shall require a two-thirds majority. Other matters shall be decided by a simple majority.

- (k) Congress may appoint Committees with prescribed terms of reference.
Such Committees shall report to Congress and their actions and decisions shall be subjected to confirmation by Congress.
- (l) English—French interpreters shall be present at all Congress Meetings.
- Art. 106 ADMINISTRATIVE COUNCIL: (COUNCIL)*
- (a) Between Congress meetings, FITA shall be managed by an Administrative Council, comprising 14 members, appointed by Congress from nominations submitted by Member Associations.
- (b) The Council shall comprise:
The President
The Four Vice-Presidents
The General Secretary
The Treasurer
Seven Other Members
Members of the Council shall hold office for four years, half the Members retiring in rotation every second year. Retiring Members shall be eligible for re-election.
Except for the Members of the Executive Committee, there shall not be more than 3 members from any one Nation, on the Council at any given time.
- (c) Council shall meet as often as the business of the Federation demands at the request of the Executive Committee, or at the instigation of five or more Member Associations.
- (d) Council decisions shall be made by a simple majority.
Postal Votes are valid.
The General Secretary and the Treasurer shall have no votes.
- (e) The President shall take the Chair at all meetings of the Council, at which he is present. In the absence of the President, one of the Vice-Presidents, or if none are present, a Member of the Administrative Council other than General Secretary or the Treasurer, shall be elected as Chairman. The President (or Chairman) shall have a casting vote only.
- (f) The quorum at any meeting of the Administrative Council shall be 8.
- (g) Vacancies which occur on the Council, may be filled by Council, but any such changes in the composition of Council must be submitted for confirmation at the next Congress meeting.
- Art. 107 EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE: (COMMITTEE)*
- (a) The Executive Officers of the Administrative Council shall form the Executive Committee as follows: —
The President.
The General Secretary.
The Treasurer.
Any two of these shall form a quorum.
- (b) Committee decisions shall be made by a simple majority.
- (c) The Committee shall handle all routine business and make decisions of a routine nature.
- Art. 108 FISCAL YEAR:*
The Financial year of FITA shall run from 1st April in one year to 31st March in the next.
- Art. 109 ANNUAL SUBSCRIPTION:*
- (a) Subscriptions shall run concurrently with the Financial year, and Congress shall determine the amount of Annual Subscription payable by Member Associations.
- (b) Subscriptions are payable in advance, and shall be paid to the FITA Treasurer before 1st April annually.

- (c) Congress may take disciplinary action against any Member Association whose subscriptions are in arrear.

Art. 110 OFFICIAL BULLETINS:

The official organ of FITA shall be the "Bulletin Officiel de la Fédération Internationale de Tir à l'Arc", and it shall be issued after each Ordinary Session of Congress.

Official Bulletins and circulars shall be sent to all Member Associations, Members of the Administrative Council, Honorary Presidents and Honorary Vice-Presidents.

Art. 111 OFFICIAL LANGUAGES:

The official languages of FITA shall be English and French.

In the event of there being a difference of interpretation between the English and the French texts in any document, the original draft of such document shall be referred to for the correct interpretation.

Art. 112 HEADQUARTERS:

The Headquarters of FITA shall be at the address of the General Secretary.

Art. 113 MOVABLE ASSETS:

The General Secretary and the Treasurer shall be responsible for the care and control of all the Federation's Movable Assets, including all stocks of FITA Plaquettes, Star Badges, Lapel Pins, Car Badges, and the like, as well as for the dies used for striking such articles incorporating the FITA emblem.

Art. 114 DISSOLUTION:

In the event of FITA becoming defunct for any reason, the net worth of the Assets of the Federation shall be divided equally amongst those National Associations which are Members of the Federation at the time of such occurrence.

Indebtedness due to the Federation, but not paid by any Member Association, shall be brought to account before any distribution is made.

PART II HONOURS AND AWARDS
Original version

Art. 200 HONORARY PRESIDENTS AND HONORARY VICE-PRESIDENTS:

Congress may elect Honorary Presidents and Honorary Vice-Presidents, who shall be distinguished persons whom the Federation desires to Honour, or persons who have distinguished themselves by their work for International Archery.

Art. 201 FITA PLAQUETTES:

- (a) *Gilt and Silver Plaquettes:*
Congress may award Gilt or Silver Plaquettes to individuals in recognition of their services to International Archery.

Recommendations covering awards of these Plaquettes may be put forward by Member Associations or Council Members and a detailed exposition supporting such recommendations should reach the General Secretary at least 6 months before a Congress meeting.

A citation covering each award shall be submitted to Congress for approval and publication in the Bulletin.

The Federation shall bear the cost of these awards.

(b) *Bronze Plaquettes:*

Individuals who have rendered Good Service towards International Archery, particularly within their own Associations, may qualify for the award of a Bronze Plaquette.

Recommendations for this award shall emanate from Member Associations, and shall be sent to the General Secretary.

These awards shall be subject to

approval by the FITA Executive Committee and shall be paid for by Member Associations making recommendations.

PART III. WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP TOURNAMENT REGULATIONS

Art. 301 BASIS OF TOURNAMENTS:
World Championship Tournaments shall normally be held every second year, and shall be decided on the Double FITA Round, shot under F.I.T.A. Target Archery Rules over four consecutive days.

Art. 302 TITLES:

- (a) *Individuals:*
"Lady Champion of the World" and "Champion of the World" shall be the titles of the winners of the grand total, Double FITA Round.

NOTE: Individuals recording the highest scores at each separate distance (Double FITA Round) are not "World Champions" and shall not be referred to as such.

(b) *Teams:*

"Lady Team Champions of the World" and "Team Champions of the World" shall be the titles of the winners of the Team event, grand total, Double FITA Round.

Each National Team shall consist of the three Archers, Ladies and Gentlemen respectively making the highest scores (Double Round), at the Championship.

No other titles shall be used.

Art. 303 F.I.T.A. MEDALS:

F.I.T.A. World Championship Medals shall be awarded as follows: —

(a) *Individual Medals:*

The big Gilt, Silver and Bronze Medals with a wreath and decorated with a ribbon in the national colours of the organising Nation, respectively for first, second, and third highest scorers, Ladies and Gentlemen, Grand Total, Double FITA Round.

- (b) The small Gilt, Silver and Bronze Medals without a wreath, respectively for first, second, and third highest scorers, Ladies and Gentlemen, for each separate Distance, Double FITA Round.

(c) *Team Medals:*

The small Gilt, Silver and Bronze Medals without a wreath to be awarded respectively to the Members of each of the first, second, and third Teams, Ladies and Gentlemen, Grand Total, Double FITA Round.

The reverse side of F.I.T.A. World Championship Tournament Medals shall be engraved in the language of the organising Nation to indicate: —

- (i) The Round or Distance.
(ii) The year of the Tournament.
(iii) The City/Place where the Tournament is held.

Art. 304 TROPHIES AND PRIZES:

The following trophies and prizes shall be awarded: —

(a) *Challenge Trophies:*

The two F.I.T.A. Silver Challenge Trophies (donated in by) to the Lady Champion of the World and the Champion of the World. These Trophies cannot be won outright.

A Challenge Trophy shall be held by the winner until the World Championship Tournament following, but shall be returned to the Organising Association of such Tournament before shooting starts.

Should no Championship Tournament

be held for 4 consecutive years, the Challenge Trophies shall be returned to the General Secretary.

Member Associations shall be responsible for ensuring that:—

(i) The name, nationality of the winner, date and place of tournament, are engraved on a Challenge Trophy.

(ii) Challenge Trophies being returned to a subsequent World Tournament or to the General Secretary, are properly packed so as to avoid damage and are returned in good time.

(iii) The costs of such engraving, packing and transportation are met.

(b) *Other Trophies and Prizes:*

These may be chosen by the Organisers and awarded at their discretion to competitors in the Individual field, as well as to members of Teams. Such prizes shall become the property of the recipients.

Art. 305 RESPONSIBILITY FOR INJURY OR DAMAGE:

F.I.T.A. shall in no circumstances accept liability for damages resulting from injury to spectators or to members of any Member Association or from the damage or loss of such member's property whilst participating in, or attending, any tournament or function organised or sponsored by F.I.T.A.

Art. 306 ALLOCATION OF TOURNAMENTS:

(a) World Championship Tournaments shall be organised by Member Associations.

(b) A Member Association may only apply for permission to organise a World Championship after having been affiliated to F.I.T.A. for at least two years.

The written application shall state where and when it is proposed to hold the Tournament.

Applicants shall confirm that, as far as can be foreseen, there would be no official obstacles to obtaining entry visas for competitors and others from any Member Association.

(c) Applications shall be considered by Congress, and Congress shall, as far as possible, decide four years in advance, where each Tournament will be held. Congress shall endeavour to ensure that Tournaments are organised by different Member Associations in turn.

(d) If a nominated Member Association is unable, through "force majeure" to hold a World Championship Tournament, the General Secretary, as well as all Member Associations, must be informed immediately.

Such Tournament may then be re-allocated to some other Member Association which volunteers to take over the arrangements.

If practicable, Congress shall deal with the re-allocation; otherwise, Council shall make the decision.

Art. 307 FINANCING OF TOURNAMENTS:

Member Associations shall be wholly responsible for financing Tournaments allocated to them, including inter alia:—

(a) Deciding upon Entry Fees;

(b) Bearing the costs of striking and engraving F.I.T.A. Medals;

(c) Providing commemorative badges for all competitors and officials;

(d) Providing accommodation for Congress Meetings;

(e) Providing non-challenge trophies and prizes at their discretion.

Art. 308 ORGANISING COMMITTEE:

The organising Association shall appoint

an Organising Committee which shall be responsible for the whole of the Administration of the Tournament.

Art. 309 ISSUE OF INVITATIONS:

At least six months before the date of the Tournament, the Organisers shall issue invitations to all Member Associations to compete. At the same time the Council Members shall be invited to attend the Tournament.

The Organisers shall use their best endeavours to:—

(a) Obtain entry Visas when needed for members of foreign Member Associations, free of charge or at a reduced fee.

(b) Obtain free passage through Customs for all competitors' Archery Equipment and Trophies.

Art. 310 ELIGIBILITY TO COMPETE:

(a) All Member Associations, in good standing may enter competitors.

(b) Only Amateurs according to the rules of their respective National Archery Associations may compete for the World Championship Titles.

(c) No Member Association may enter more than 12 competitors.

Art. 311 DETAILS OF PARTICIPANTS:

Member Associations taking part are required to send to the Organisers:—

(a) The estimated number of their entries at least four weeks before the date when shooting is to commence.

(b) A List giving details of the competitors' names, distinguishing clearly between Ladies and Gentlemen, to be in the hands of the Organising Committee at least two weeks before the first day of the Tournament.

Art. 312 TEAMS CAPTAINS:

The archers of a Member Association shall be represented by a Teams Captain or a Manager, who shall contact the Organising Committee as soon as possible after their arrival.

Art. 313 PROGRAMME:

The programme for the Tournament shall be on the following lines:—

(a) *The day before the Tournament:*

(i) Practice Targets shall be made available at all distances on the Tournament ground, during convenient hours fixed by the Organising Committee.
(ii) Meeting of Teams Captains.
(iii) First Congress Session.

(b) *The First Day of the Tournament:*

(i) Ceremonial Opening with competing Teams headed by their Captains, and formed up in alphabetical order of Nationality, according to the choice of language of the Organising Member Association. The Teams from the Organising Member Association shall be the last.
(ii) Inspection of Equipment by T.C.
(iii) Commencement of Shooting:—

Ladies. Gentlemen.

36 Arrows at 70 m. 90 m.

36 Arrows at 60 m. 70 m.

(c) *Second Day of the Tournament:*

(i) Inspection of Equipment by T.C.
(ii) Completion of 1st FITA Round.

Ladies & Gentlemen.

36 Arrows at 50 m.

36 Arrows at 30 m.

(d) *Third Day of the Tournament:*

(i) Inspection of Equipment by T.C.
(ii) First part of 2nd FITA Round.

Ladies. Gentlemen.

36 Arrows at 70 m. 90 m.

36 Arrows at 60 m. 70 m.

(e) *Last Day of the Tournament:*

- (i) Inspection of Equipment by T.C.
(ii) Completion of 2nd FITA Round.

Ladies & Gentlemen.

36 Arrows at 50 m.

36 Arrows at 30 m.

(iii) Closing Ceremony. Proclaiming the two Champions of the World, the 2nd and 3rd Ladies and Gentlemen, and proclaiming the Ladies and Gentlemen Teams Champions of the World. As and when each of the foregoing successful competitors' achievement is announced, their respective National Anthems will be played.

(f) The Day following the Tournament:

- (i) Second Congress Session.
(ii) Arrangements for Prizegiving.

Shooting shall start each day in the morning.

The time and place of Congress Sessions shall be fixed by the Executive Committee in consultation with the Organising Committee.

The detailed programme, including any special events, covering the whole period of the Tournament and stating the time and place where each event is to take place, must be approved by the F.I.T.A. Executive Committee before being sent out, and should be in the hands of Member Associations at least 2 months before the Tournament.

Art. 314 ORDER OF SHOOTING:

Archers shall shoot one at a time on each target in rotation as follows:—

e.g. 3 Archers per Target

A—B—C

C—A—B

B—C—A

A—B—C etc.

(The order of shooting may be changed temporarily for the purpose of changing a string or making other minor adjustments to Equipment).

Art. 315 DIRECTOR OF SHOOTING (FIELD CAPTAIN)

The Organising Committee shall appoint a Field Captain, who shall not participate in the shooting, and whose duties shall include:—

(a) Controlling the shooting with a whistle, regulating the timing of ends, and the order in which Competitors will occupy the shooting line.

(b) Instituting and enforcing any reasonable safety measures he considers necessary.

(c) Exercising control over the use of Loudspeakers, the activities of photographers, etc., so that the comfort and concentration of competitors is not disturbed.

(d) Ensuring that Spectators remain behind the barriers enclosing the shooting ground.

A Deputy Field Captain may be appointed at the discretion of the Organising Committee.

Art. 316 SCORERS:

The Organising Committee shall appoint an adequate Scores Committee and one scorer for each Target.

Scorers shall not participate in the shooting. At distances of 90 and 70 and 60 metres, scoring shall take place after every second end of 3 arrows.

At distances of 50 and 30 metres, scoring shall take place after every end of 3 arrows. After arrows have been scored and drawn from the targets, all arrow holes shall be suitably marked.

The duty of the Scores Committee will be:—

- (a) To record on a large scoreboard, after each end, the progressive totals of at least the first four ladies and the first four gentlemen.
- (b) To record on another large scoreboard, after each distance, the progressive totals for every competitor.
- (c) To provide daily results and progressive totals daily, and, after the last day of the Tournament, the Grand Total for Individuals and the Team results. Copies of these results shall be made available to: —

Teams Captains.

Members of the Administrative Council and Congress Representatives who are present.

Members of the T.C.

The Field Captain.

The Press.

Art. 317 TECHNICAL COMMISSION (T.C.)

There shall be appointed a Technical Commission (T.C.), consisting of three members who shall take no part in the shooting. The Organising Committee shall appoint the Chairman of the T.C.

The other two members of the T.C. shall be appointed by the Teams Captains in meeting, on the day preceding the commencement of the Tournament.

No two members of the T.C. shall belong to the same Member Association.

The duties of the T.C. shall be: —

- (a) To check all distances; the dimensions of Target Faces; that the centres of the Golds are the correct height from the ground; that all Buttresses are set back at a uniform angle.
- (b) To check competitors' equipment before shooting starts, and at any time thereafter during the tournament.
- (c) To check the conduct of the shooting.
- (d) To check the conduct of the scoring.
- (e) To consult with the Field Captain on questions which arise regarding the shooting, and handle any disputes or appeals which may arise.
- (f) In liaison with the Field Captain, to interrupt the shooting if necessary, because of weather conditions, a serious accident, or like occurrence, but to ensure if at all possible, that each day's programme is completed on that day.
- (g) In liaison with the Field Captain, to warn slow Archers, and, if necessary thereafter, to fix a maximum time per end after which such archers may not shoot any further arrows at that end.
- (h) To consider complaints or requests from Teams Captains regarding Field Equipment (Buttresses, Faces, etc.), and where applicable to take suitable action.
- (i) To furnish a report on the Tournament to Congress.

The decisions of the T.C. shall be made by a simple majority of votes.

Art. 318 DRAW FOR POSITIONS AND TARGET LIST

- (a) The draw for target numbers and for order of shooting shall be arranged by the Organising Committee as follows: —

An urn will contain as many cards as there are Nations competing, each card bearing the name of one Nation. The Chairman or Secretary of the Organising Association will first draw the name of one Nation. From another urn the names of all competitors from that Nation will be drawn. These will be allocated one to each target in the order in which they are drawn. Having

finished with one Nation, another Nation is drawn, and so on, until all the names have been drawn.

The competitors shall be numbered as they are drawn: —

1 A 2 A 3 A . . .
1 B 2 B 3 B . . .
1 C 2 C 3 C Etc.

Ladies and Gentlemen shall be drawn separately, but the target numbers shall run consecutively.

The draw for target positions should, whenever practicable, take place in the presence of one Member of that Nation's Olympic Committee.

Should there be any substitution between the time of the draw and the time of the start of the Tournament, the new archer shall take the withdrawn archer's place. Should there be more than one replacement in any Team during this time, a special draw will be arranged between the withdrawn archers and the replacements from the same Nation.

Only three such changes may be made by any one Nation.

No archer may be replaced by another after the commencement of the shooting.

- (b) Lists of competitors in Target number order and alphabetical order, showing the nationality of each competitor, shall be available two days before the commencement of the Tournament for competitors and officials.

Art. 319 FIELD LAYOUT:

- (a) All Competitors shall be accommodated on one Field.

The Ladies portion of the Field shall be separated from the Gentlemen's portion of the Field by at least 5 metres.

- (b) Provision shall be made if at all possible, for sufficient Target Buttresses to allow of not more than 3 archers to each target. If the Field does not allow this, 4 archers shall be the maximum at each Target.
- (c) Buttresses shall be pegged securely to the ground, to prevent them from being blown over by wind. Any portion of a buttress likely to damage an arrow, shall be covered.
- (d) Each buttress shall be numbered. The numbers shall be 30 cms. square and shall be black figures on a yellow background, alternating with yellow figures on a black background. (E.G., No. 1 Black on Yellow, No. 2 Yellow on Black, etc.).

Target Numbers shall be affixed above or below the centre of each buttress, so as to be clear of the Target face.

- (e) Points on the shooting line directly opposite each buttress shall be marked and numbered correspondingly.

- (f) Lines at right angles to the shooting line, and extending from the shooting line to the target line, making lanes to contain one, two or three buttresses may be laid down.

- (g) Suitable barriers shall be erected around the field to keep spectators back. Such barriers should be at least 10 metres behind the waiting line, at least 10 metres away from each side of the field; and as far beyond the target base line as necessary to prevent members of the public from moving past an Archer's line of vision or shooting.

Art. 320 TARGET FACES

Target faces may be made of paper, cloth or any other suitable material. All faces shall be uniform and of the same material.

Art. 321 MISCELLANEOUS EQUIPMENT

In addition to the usual equipment for Archery Tournaments, the organisers shall provide: —

- (a) Numbers to be worn by each competitor: — 1A, 1B, 1C, 2A, 2B, 2C, etc.
- (b) A device to indicate the order of shooting: — A.B.C.; C.A.B.; B.C.A.; etc. The letters shall be large enough to be read by all competitors from their shooting positions.
- (c) One large scoreboard for progressive totals after each end, for at least the first four ladies and the first four gentlemen.
- (d) Another large scoreboard for displaying the progressive scores of all competitors after each distance.
- (e) Flags, or some suitable device, whereby Scorers can call for a member of the T.C.
- (f) Sufficient chairs or benches behind the waiting line for all competitors, Teams Captains and other officials.

Art. 322 PRACTICE DAY

Targets which are made available for practice shall be so spaced that Archers retrieving arrows from one target will not be in danger from Archers shooting at another.

The Field Captain or a deputy shall be present and in control whenever practice is in progress.

Art. 323 QUERIES, APPEALS AND DISPUTES:

- (a) Scorers shall refer any Query about the value of an arrow in a Target to the T.C. before any arrows are drawn. The Ruling of the T.C. shall be final.
- (b) A mistake on a score sheet, discovered before the arrows are drawn may be corrected, but the correction must be witnessed and initialled before the arrows are drawn, by a member of the T.C. and the archer concerned. Any other dispute concerning entries on a score sheet shall be referred to the T.C. by a Teams Captain.
- (c) Should a Target Face become unreasonably worn or otherwise disfigured, or should there be any other complaint about Field Equipment, an Archer or his Teams Captain may appeal to the T.C. to have the defective item replaced or remedied.
- (d) Questions concerning the conduct of the shooting or the conduct of a competitor shall be lodged with the T.C. the same day.
- (e) Queries regarding daily published results shall be lodged with the T.C. without any undue delay, and in any event must be lodged in time to allow corrections to be made before the prizegiving.
- (f) In the event of a competitor not being satisfied with a ruling given by the T.C., he may, except as provided for in subparagraph (a) above, appeal through his Teams Captain to Congress in writing.

Trophies or prizes which may be affected by a dispute shall not be awarded until Congress ruling has been given.

Art. 324 CHANGING EQUIPMENT DURING SHOOTING:

If it becomes necessary for an Archer to use tackle which has not been inspected by

the T.C., the onus is on such Archer to show such tackle to the T.C. before using it.

Any competitor contravening this rule may be excluded from the shooting.

Art. 325 LIST OF FINAL SCORES:

Not later than one month after the Tournament, the Organising Committee shall distribute to all Member Associations, to all Members of the Administrative Council, and to all Competitors and Officials, through their National Associations:—

(a) A Final Score List, for Ladies and Gentlemen separately, in descending order of Grand Total Score.

The score and the placing of each competitor in each single FITA Round and in each Double Distance shall also be shown.

(b) A list of Team Scores for Ladies and Gentlemen separately arranged in descending order of Grand Total Score, giving the names and scores of each of the Three Archers in each Team.

PART IV OLYMPIC GAMES REGULATIONS

PART V A. THE F.I.T.A. MAIL MATCH

Art. 500 FREQUENCY

The F.I.T.A. Mail Match shall normally be held once each year.

Art. 501 BASIS:

(a) The Match shall be determined on the basis of a single FITA Round shot on one day under F.I.T.A. Target Archery Rules, in a Tournament recognised by a Member Association.

(b) Member Associations wishing to participate, shall specify a month during which its members may shoot for the F.I.T.A. Mail Match.

Art. 502 SCORES:

(a) Member Associations shall submit their entries to the General Secretary to reach him by not later than 31st December of the year of the year of the Mail Match, together with a declaration covering:—

(i) The name or description, place and date of the Tournament.

(ii) Confirmation that the Tournament was shot under F.I.T.A. Target Archery Rules.

(iii) Confirmation that all Archers, whose scores are submitted, were members of the Association at the time.

(iv) The following details for each competitor:—

The name and sex of archers.

Score for each distance.

Total score.

Hits.

Number of Golds.

(b) Not more than 12 scores shall be submitted from any Member Association.

Art. 503 TEAMS:

Teams shall consist of the first three Ladies and the first three Gentlemen respectively from each Member Association.

Art. 504 F.I.T.A. MAIL MATCH DIPLOMAS:

F.I.T.A. Mail Match Diplomas shall be awarded as follows:—

(a) A Diploma to the ten best Ladies and Gentlemen, individually;

(b) A Diploma to each Member of the three best Teams, Ladies and Gentlemen.

Art. 505 PUBLICATION OF RESULTS:

Results and complete scores lists shall be circulated by the General Secretary to all

Member Associations and to Members of the Administrative Council.

PART V B. THE F.I.T.A. STAR BADGE

Art. 520 QUALIFICATION:

Any Archer belonging to a Member Association may apply for the award of a F.I.T.A. Star, provided that he/she scores at least 1,000 points over a single FITA Round shot at a Major Tournament recognised by a Member Association, or any Tournament recognised by F.I.T.A. as an International Tournament.

Art. 521 APPLICATIONS:

(a) Applications shall be sent through a Member Association to the General Secretary, supported by a declaration covering:—

(i) The name or description, place and date of the Tournament.

(ii) Confirmation that the Tournament was shot under F.I.T.A. Target Archery Rules.

(iii) Confirmation that all Archers, whose applications are submitted were members of the Association at the time.

(iv) The names and sex of Archers.

(b) Original Score Sheets or properly witnessed copies shall accompany each application.

Art. 522 FINANCING:

Member Associations shall be held responsible for forwarding the cost of the Badge to the F.I.T.A. Treasurer.

Art. 523 PUBLICATION:

Details of new awards of F.I.T.A. Star Badges shall be circulated by the General Secretary to all Member Associations and Members of the Administrative Council.

PART VI RECORDS:

Art. 600 DEFINITION:

A new Record shall be established when a Score is at least one point higher than an existing Record.

Art. 601 WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP TOURNAMENT RECORDS:

The following World Championship Records shall be recognised:—

(a) Individuals:

Grand Total; Double FITA Round.

Each Distance; Double FITA Round.

(b) Teams:

Grand Total; Double FITA Round for the best 3 Archers from the same Member Association.

Art. 602 CONFIRMATION OF WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP TOURNAMENT RECORDS:

World Championship Records shall be confirmed by Congress at the Session immediately following the Tournament.

Art. 603 WORLD RECORDS:

The following World Records shall be recognised:—

(a) Individuals:

Total, Single FITA Round.

Each Distance, Single FITA Round.

(b) Teams:

Total, Single FITA Round for the best 3 archers from the same Member Association.

Individual World Records may be established at World Championships, at Olympic Tournaments, at National Championships, or at National or International Tournaments conforming to championship standards, organised by, or under the Control of, Member Associations.

Team World Records may be established at World Championships, at Olympic Tournaments, or at any International Tournament organised by, or under the control of Member Associations, at which there is competition between National Teams of three Ladies or three Gentlemen.

Art. 604 CONFIRMATION OF WORLD RECORD:

(a) World Records shall be subject to confirmation by the Executive Committee.

(b) Scores made at World Championships and Olympic Tournaments shall be submitted to the Executive Committee by the General Secretary.

(c) Scores made at other Tournaments shall be sent to the General Secretary by the Member Association under the control of which the Tournament was organised, together with a declaration covering:—

(i) The name or description, place and date of the Tournament.

(ii) Confirmation that the Tournament was shot under F.I.T.A. Rules.

(iii) Confirmation that an archer in respect of whose scores Records are being claimed, was a member of a Member Association at the time.

(iv) Name, nationality and sex of archers.

(v) Details of the Record claimed, and supported by the original score sheet or a properly witnessed copy thereof.

(d) The Executive Committee shall not ratify a claim for a World Record until 30 days after the Tournament.

(e) Should a World Record be broken by two or more equal Scores made on the same day, the Archers shall be declared Joint World Record Holders.

Art. 605 PUBLICATION OF RECORDS:

Records for Ladies and Gentlemen shall be kept separate.

Details of new Records shall be circulated by the General Secretary to all Member Associations and Members of the Administrative Council.

PART VII TARGET ARCHERY RULES OF SHOOTING

Art. 700 THE FITA ROUND:

The FITA Round consists of 36 arrows shot from each of the following distances: 90, 70, 50 & 30 metres for Gentlemen. 70, 60, 50 & 30 metres for Ladies.

Shooting shall be in one direction only, and will commence at the longest distance and finish at the shortest distance in the order set out above.

A Round may be shot in one day or over two successive days. If a Round is shot over two days, the two longer distances shall be shot on the first day and the two shorter distances shall be shot on the second day.

In the event of a Programme including a FITA Round as well as some other Rounds, the FITA Round shall always be shot first.

Art. 701 TARGET FACES:

Scoring Values:

The Scoring values are:—

Description:

There are two Standard circular F.I.T.A. Target Faces, 122 cm. and 80 cm. diameters.

Both these faces are divided into five concentric colour zones arranged from the centre outwards as follows:—

Gold (Yellow), Red, Light Blue, Black and White.

Each colour zone is in turn divided by a thin line into two zones of equal width, thus making in all ten scoring zones of equal width measured from the centre of the Gold; 6.1 cm. on the 122 cm. face, and 4.0 cm. on the 80 cm. face.

Such dividing lines, and any dividing lines which may be used between colours, shall be made entirely within the higher scoring zone in each case.

Any line marking the outermost edge of the white shall be made entirely within the scoring zone.

For distances of 90, 70 and 60 metres, the Target Face of 122 cm. diameter shall be used.

For distances of 50 and 30 metres, the Target Face of 80 cm. diameter shall be used.

Art. 702 RANGE LAYOUT:

- (a) The Range shall be squared off and each distance accurately measured from a point vertically beneath the Gold of each Target to the Shooting line.
- (b) A waiting line shall be indicated at least five metres behind the shooting line.
- (c) Each Buttress shall be set up at an angle of about 15 degrees.
- (d) The Centre of the Gold shall be 130 cm. above the ground.

Art. 703 EQUIPMENT:

- (a) Bows of any type except cross-bows may be used.
- (b) Arrows of any type, except arrows which will cause undue damage to target faces and buttresses, may be used.
- All the arrows of each competitor shall be marked with the Archer's name or insignia.
- (c) Field glasses and other visual aids may be used between shots. Micro-hole glasses for use while shooting are not allowed. Spectacles, gloves, finger tabs, arm guards, bracers and quivers may be used.
- (d) Simple bowsights or bow marks are allowed.

Sights embodying a lens or a prism are not allowed.

Points of aim on the ground are allowed, and these may not protrude more than 15 cms. above the ground, and may not exceed a diameter of 7.5 cms.

- (e) Draw check indicators may be used.
- (f) An attachment on the string is allowed, but may not exceed a diameter of 1 cm. in any direction.

Art. 704 RANGE CONTROL AND SAFETY:

- (a) A Field Captain shall be appointed to control the shooting and be responsible for safety precautions.

The Field Captain shall control the shooting with a whistle.

One blast on the whistle will be the signal for shooting to start.

Two blasts on the whistle will be the signal for Archers to move forward to score and collect arrows.

A series of blasts on the whistle will

be the signal for all shooting to cease. If shooting is suspended during an end for any reason, one blast on the whistle will be the signal for shooting to re-commence.

- (b) At Tournaments, at least two Field officers shall be appointed. These Field officers shall work under the direction of the Field Captain, and their responsibilities will include:
 - (i) Inspecting Equipment.
 - (ii) Observing that the shooting is conducted in accordance with these Rules.
 - (iii) Resolving disputes and queries in connection with the shooting and scoring.
 - (c) Trial shots are not allowed in any direction, on the shooting ground during the days of any competition.
 - (d) No archer may draw his bow, with or without an arrow, except when standing on the Shooting Line. If an arrow is used, the archer shall aim towards the Targets but only after being satisfied that the field is clear both in front and behind the Targets. If an Archer, while drawing his bow with an arrow before the shooting starts, or during breaks between distances, loses an arrow, intentionally or otherwise, such an arrow shall count as part of his quota of arrows for the distance to be shot but shall not be scored, even if it hits his Target.
 - (e) While shooting is in progress, only those Archers whose turn it is to shoot may be on the shooting line. All other Archers with their tackle shall remain behind the waiting line. After an Archer has shot his arrows, he shall retire behind the waiting line. The last Archer on a Target may, however, remain on the shooting line to keep company with another archer still shooting.
 - (f) No Archer may touch the tackle of another without the latter's consent.
 - (g) An Archer who arrives after shooting has started, shall forfeit the number of arrows already shot, unless the Field Captain is satisfied that he was delayed by circumstances beyond his control, in which case he may be allowed to make up the arrows lost after the distance then being shot has been completed.
- Art. 705 SHOOTING:**
- (a) Each Archer shall shoot his arrows in ends of 3 arrows each.
 - (b) Excepting for persons who are permanently disabled, archers shall shoot from a standing position and without support, with one foot on each side of the shooting line.
 - (c) An arrow shall not be deemed to have been shot, if the Archer can touch it with his bow without moving his feet from their position in relation to the shooting line.
 - (d) While an Archer is on the shooting line, he shall receive no assistance or information, by word or otherwise, from anyone, other than for the purpose of making essential changes in equipment.
- Art. 706 SCORING:**
- (a) One Scorer shall be appointed for each target.
 - (b) At 90, 70 and 60 metres, scoring shall take place after every second end (6 arrows) at World Championship Tournaments, but at other Tournaments scoring may take place after each end of 3 arrows or after every second end (6 arrows). At 50 and 30 metres, scoring shall always take place after each end of 3 arrows.
 - (c) Scorers shall enter the value of each arrow on Score Sheets as called out by the Archer to whom the arrows belong. Other Archers on that target shall check the value of each arrow called out. Only Arrows scoring Ten points shall be referred to as "Golds".
 - (d) Neither the arrows nor the face shall be touched until all the arrows on that target have been recorded.
 - (e) An arrow shall be scored according to the position of the shaft in the target face.
 - (f) If more than three arrows (or six as the case may be), belonging to the same archer, should be found in the target, only the three lowest (or six lowest, as the case may be) in value shall be scored. Should an archer be found to repeat this, he may be disqualified.
 - (g) Should the shaft of an arrow touch two colours, or touch any dividing line between scoring zones, that arrow shall score the higher value of the zones affected.
 - (h) Unless all arrow holes are suitably marked on each occasion when arrows are scored and drawn from the target, arrows rebounding from the target face shall not be scored.
 - (i) An Arrow hitting:
 - (i) The target and rebounding, shall score according to its point of impact on the target, provided that all arrow holes have been marked, and provided that an unmarked hole or mark made by the rebounding arrow can be identified.
 - (ii) Another arrow in the nock and remaining embedded therein, shall score according to the value of the arrow struck.
 - (iii) Another arrow, and then hitting the target face after deflection, shall score as it lies in the target.
 - (iv) Another arrow, and then rebounding from the target, shall score the value of the struck arrow, provided the damaged arrow can be identified.
 - (v) The target face after rebounding off the ground, shall not score.
 - (vi) A target other than an Archer's own target, shall not score.
 - (j) The Field Captain will ensure that, after scoring, no arrows are left in the targets before any signal is given for shooting to re-commence. If this inadvertently happens, the shooting shall not be interrupted. An Archer may shoot that end with other arrows, or make up the arrows lost after shooting over that distance has been completed. In such circumstances, the Field Captain shall participate in the scoring after that end, making sure that the arrows which remained in the target, are checked back to the Archer's score card, before any arrows are withdrawn from the target.
 - (k) In the event of an archer leaving arrows, e.g., on the ground in the target area, he may use others provided he informs the Field Captain before shooting. The Field Captain

- shall exercise such checks as he deems fit in each circumstance.
- (1) An Archer may delegate authority to score and collect his arrows to his Team Captain or to another archer on his own target.
 - (m) Score sheets shall be signed by the Scorer and the Archer, denoting that the Archer agrees with the score, and thereafter he may make no claim for any alteration of the score.
- If the scorer is participating in the shooting, his score sheet shall be signed by some other archer on the same target.
- (n) In the event of a tie in score, the results shall be determined as follows: —

(i) *For Individuals:*

The Archer, of those tying, with the greatest number of scoring hits.

If this is also a tie, then the Archer of those so tying with the greatest number of Golds (Hits scoring 10 points).

If this is also a tie, then the Archer of those so tying, with the greatest number of hits scoring 9 points.

If this is also a tie, then the Archer so tying shall be declared equal.

(ii) *For Teams:*

The Team, of those tying, having the Archer making the highest individual score.

If this is also a tie, then the Team of those so tying, having the Archer making the second highest individual score.

If this is also a tie, then the Teams so tying, shall be declared equal.

PART VIII FIELD ARCHERY RULES OF SHOOTING

INTERNATIONAL FIELD ARCHERY RULES:

Art. 800 TERMS AND DEFINITIONS

UNIT — A 14-target course including all official shots.

ROUND — Two such units, or twice around one.

DOUBLE ROUND — Two complete rounds.

POST — Shooting position.

FACE — Target face.

BUTT — Any object against which face is placed.

SHOT — This term in connection with the post number, i.e., "4th shot", shall be used in referring to the different shots on any course.

SPOT — Aiming centre.

Art. 801 FACES:

Four face sizes shall be used.

(a) A 60 cm. face with a 30 cm. centre bull and a 10 cm. spot.

(b) A 45 cm. face with a 22 1/2 cm. centre bull and a 7 1/2 cm. spot.

(c) A 30 cm. face with a 15 cm. centre bull and a 5 cm. spot.

(d) A 15 cm. face with a 7 1/2 cm. centre bull and a 2 1/2 cm. spot.

The outside ring shall be black. The bull shall be white and the spot shall be black. Animal targets bearing these official round faces may be used. In which case the faces need not be painted, only outlined, but aiming centre or spot must be plainly visible. Spot must be painted some colour sharply contrasting with target colour. This same spot and ring target is official without animal silhouette.

Art. 802

All butts must be so placed that the full face is exposed to the Archer.

Art. 803

A standard unit shall consist of the following 14 shots: —

15, 20, 25 and 30 metres at a 30 cm. face (4 arrows at each distance).

35, 40 and 45 metres at 45 cm. face (4 arrows at each distance).

50, 55 and 60 metres at 60 cm. face (4 arrows at each distance).

And the following four position shots; each arrow to be shot from a different or at a different target: —

35 metres at 45 cm. face, all from the same distance, but from different positions or at different targets.

30, 35, 40 and 45 metres at 45 cm. face.

45, 55, 65 and 75 metres at 60 cm. face.

6, 8, 10 and 12 metres at 15 cm. face.

Art. 804

A 5% variation in distance is permitted where necessary because of terrain. All shortages, however, must be made up on another target in the same unit. In laying out the course any order may be used as the official shooting order on any four-position shot.

SHOOTING RULES:

Art. 805

Any kind of bow, except a cross bow, and any kind of arrow, except broadheads or arrows which would unreasonably damage a target face, may be used.

Art. 806

A Field Captain shall be appointed and it shall be his duties to: —

(a) See that a target captain and two scorers are appointed for each group.

(b) Designate the order in which groups are to shoot or assign the posts from which each group is to start, depending on which system is used.

(c) Be the final authority in settling any disputes that may arise over rules or conduct of the Tournament.

Art. 807

The duty of the target captain shall be to order the shooting at his target and to settle all local questions. His decision on arrow values shall be final. Other decisions may be referred on appeal to the Field Captain.

Art. 808

The scorers shall keep an account of every arrow that hits the target and at each target compare the scores.

Art. 809

Archers shall shoot in groups of not less than 3 or more than 5; 4 shall be the preferred number.

Art. 810

Each Archer shall shoot 4 arrows at each of the 14 target layouts in a unit. In 10 cases this shall mean shooting the 4 arrows from a single post at a single face. In the other 4 it may mean either shooting 1 arrow from each of 4 posts at a single face, or it may mean shooting all 4 arrows from a single post but at 4 separate faces.

Art. 811

Arrows must remain in the face until withdrawn in the presence of the scorers.

Art. 812

Shooting at each Target shall be in the order of the scores made on the previous target, i.e., highest scorer first, etc. In case of a tie the target captain may state the order of shooting. When the course allows, two may shoot at a time and it is highly recommended that all courses be laid out to allow for this.

Archers shall stand with both feet back of the shooting line and no one shall approach

the target until all have finished shooting. An exception to this rule may be made when shooting at the 15 cm. face, where scoring is allowed after each archer has shot his 4 arrows.

Art. 813

One group shall not hold up the following groups while looking for lost arrows. Enough arrows shall be carried so that each archer may continue shooting and return later to find missing arrows.

Art. 814

An Archer who has to stop shooting because of a broken string or a broken bow is allowed to continue shooting after changing the string or bow. His shooting must be completed before the group leaves the target.

SCORING:

Art. 815

The scoring is 5 points for the bullseye, including spot, and 3 for the outer circle.

Art. 816

The status for doubtful arrows shall be determined before drawing any arrows from the target, and such an arrow may not be touched until after being recorded.

Art. 817

The Target Captain shall be the final judge of all disputed arrows.

Art. 818

An arrow cutting two rings shall be scored as being in the ring of the greater value. The outer line of the field archery target is outside the scoring field. For that reason the arrow must cut the line so that no colour of the line can be seen between arrow and scoring field before a hit may be counted. The same is true for the inner line between the two circles. Skids or glances into the face shall not be counted.

Art. 819

If an arrow telescopes an arrow already in the face, the value shall be the same for both arrows.

Art. 820

An arrow passing through the face, but still in the butt, may be pushed back and scored as a hit in the circle through which it went. Such an arrow may not be withdrawn and then stuck back through the target.

Art. 821

Witnessed bounces or arrows passing completely through the target may be scored as 3 points.

Art. 822

No group of less than 3 shall turn in an official score.

Art. 823

No Archer may practice on any shot of the course to be used for tournament shooting later the same day. Special practice targets should be supplied.

Art. 824

In case of a tie in the total score the order of the Archers shall be determined by: —

(a) The greatest number of hit targets.

(b) The greatest number of scoring hits.

(c) Tossing.

GENERAL:

Art. 825

Field archery faces shall not be placed over any larger target nor shall there be any marks on the butt or foreground that could be used as points of aim.

Art. 826

All posts shall be numbered, but the distances shall not be given.

Art. 827

Ladies may compete against Gentlemen, but Gentlemen may not compete in Ladies events.

Art. 828

Archers must use bows free from any sights, marks or blemishes that could be used in aiming. This applies to the string also.

Art. 829

At no time shall any device be allowed that would in any manner be of aid in estimating the distance of any shot. Nor may the archer refer to any memoranda of any kind that could in any manner be a means of improving his or her score.

Art. 830

A dropped arrow or a failure shot, where is started and to serve as a jury to deal with possible protests against individuals the arrow falls to the ground within reach for the archer's bow when he or she is standing in prescribed shooting position, shall not be deemed to have been shot, and may be fetched by the archer.

Art. 831

Other arrows may under no circumstances be reshotted.

Art. 832

A technical committee shall be elected to check the equipment before a tournament or arrangements.

Such protests must be lodged in writing to the technical committee within one hour after the completion of the tournament.

Art. 833

It shall be the duty of every contestant to see that the rules are being followed and to report violations.
