# FÉDÉRATION INTERNATIONALE DE TIR À L'ARC

## FROM 1931 TO 1939.

In writing this account of International Archery it must be clearly understood that I have had only my own notes, photographs and memory to work on, so that the story is, of necessity, incomplete and entirely from the British angle.

I have intentionally omitted scores, and names of teams, as I could not give these accurately. Mrs. Inger Frith asked me to undertake this survey after seeing my photograph albums and notes, and, being the only English archer now shooting who was connected with FITA from its earliest days. I agreed.

In 1932 I was the wife of Brigadier-General C. E. Macquoid who did so much for International Archery and was the first British Secretary and delegate, and took an active interest until his death in 1945. I hope that any errors will be overlooked by my continental readers.

The idea of International Archery competitions was first conceived by Poland, who, in 1931, invited archers from two or three other countries to go to Warsaw and shoot. I have no data of this meeting as no English archers were present, but the idea was born.

In August, 1932, Poland again sent invitations to France, Belgium and Sweden and this time to England. A party of eight men and women including General Macquoid and myself, duly arrived in Warsaw prepared to shoot for the first time abroad. The British party was led by the late Lord Revelstoke, who took great interest in our sport, although he did not shoot. No definite rules had been drawn up, and the arena where we shot was rough and unprepared, compared with modern standards. In spite of this we did a great deal of shooting at various distances, were much photographed, and were royally entertained by our hosts, with dinners and excursions. The weather was perfect and much hard work was done "behind the scenes". At a conference meeting attended by delegates from each country competing, rules and regulations were drawn up. The first President was naturally a Pole, Dr. Stanislas Pieschala, a most charming gentleman who devoted himself to the cause of FITA until he lost his life during the war. General Macquoid was elected Secretary for Great Britain. I have a photograph I took at this meeting of M. Lamont Reith of Belgium, winner at 30 metres with 14 Golds. Regular distances, as we know them now, were not shot in 1932, but the foundations of FITA were firmly laid. Lord Revelstoke proposed that the next meeting be held in England.

In August, 1933, the third International Meeting was held in the grounds of Ranalegh Club, London. Invitations were sent to France, Belgium, Poland, Sweden and Czechoslovakia who sent teams of 4 to 8 men and women. Also two young visitors from USA shot for individual prizes. An impressive collection of trophies was being collected, thanks to the generosity of competing countries. Also, medals were struck for each meeting to be won at each distance. These now being 90 m., 70 m., 50 m., called the Long round, and 50 m., 35 m., and 25 m., being the Short round for men. Women shot 70 m., 60 m., and 50 m., 35 m., and 25 m. These rounds were shot twice over a period of four days.

There were also individual prizes or medals. "Champion du Monde" and "Championesse du Monde" being the highest and most sort after award. Trophies were also awarded for

teams. We were very fortunate with the weather and attracted a large and interested number of spectators. Outings to places of interest were arranged for our guests and a banquet was held at the conclusion at which the trophies were presented by the President for England, Lord Revelstoke.

In 1934, Sweden was the host country and shooting took place at Båstad, but owing to various circumstances Great Britain was unable to send a team, though General Macquoid attended the Conference as Delegate.

The 1935 Meeting took place in Brussels at the Belgium Archers' invitation and was beautifully arranged in the stadium of the Exhibition which was being held that year. Teams came from six countries which had shot previously and took part. Each country could also send individual archers up to 20 including those selected for the team. We had perfect weather and spent the evenings visiting the various pavilions and restaurants. Unfortunately, the last day was marred by the tragic death of Queen Astrid in a motoring accident and the banquet was cancelled. What, I think, impressed us foreigners was the rapidity with which the City became draped in black with pictures of the Queen in every window within a matter of hours. I went to the Laeken Palace to see the mountains of wreathes being taken in. It was an impressive and moving scene.

In 1936 we went to Prague, but I was unable to go, so have no record of this meeting. The English team was under the management of General Macquoid, who also attended the Conference. I heard that the meeting was much enjoyed by all who attended. The Conferences, held every year, were a good opportunity for representatives of all countries sending delegates to discuss the work of FITA and to agree to alterations in rules as became necessary, as the Organization was growing rapidly. The Mayor of Prague held a reception for the delegates at the conclusion.

The first invitation from France came in 1937. I accompanied my husband, as usual, but for the first time was selected for the Ladies team. Shooting took place in the Stade Jean Bouin in Paris. I have particularly happy memories of this meeting because at the opening ceremony my husband had the honour of receiving a gold medal from the hands of the Ministre du Sport, inscribed, "Education Physique" "Republique Francaise" on a blue and gold riband. Also, my great friend, Mrs. Ingo Simon, became "Championesse du Monde". We were again fortunate in being in Paris that year as we were able to see the Exhibition being held round the Eiffel Tower.

The 1938 International Meeting was again held in England. Shooting took place in the historical grounds of the Honorary Artillery Company in Finsbury, London, the same grounds on which the City Trained Bands practised their archery to repulse the Spanish Armada in 1588. Dr. Pieschala, as President of FITA, was present. Also visitors from USA Expeditions included a visit to the State Apartments at Windsor Castle, which was much enjoyed by our visitors. At this meeting several competitors were using the "new steel bows". To give an idea of the scores being made at this time, F. Hadas of Czechoslovakia became Champion du Monde with a total score of 2,308 and Mrs. Nettleton and Mrs. Weston-Martyr

of England tied for the Ladies Championship with 1,973 each!

The 9th, and, for several years, the last meeting was held in Oslo, Norway, in August, 1939. How little we knew that this was the last occasion on which we should meet some of the friends we had made over the years, in International Archery. Certain names stand out in my memory. First, Dr. Pieschala, President, Messieurs. Quintin, Paul Demare and R. Bédary of France. M. Magniette of Belgium, Major von Hofsten of Sweden and Mme. Janina Kurkowska, who was four times Lady World Champion before the war and once since, and I am happy to know that after 25 years she is still shooting and making fine scores despite the many trials she suffered.

There are many others worthy of mention from countries brought together by Archery. Our visit to Oslo was also memorable — for the wonderful scenery the entertainment of our hosts, and the grand shooting facilities. We sailed for home just one month before the second world war was declared.

My story of the early years of International Archery ends here and, as I said at the beginning, is not a complete record; but if it gives as much pleasure to present day Archers everywhere to read as it has to me in reviving old memories, I shall be satisfied.

MINUTES OF THE XX<sup>TH</sup> INTERNATIONAL ARCHERY CONGRESS  
PROCÈS-VERBAL DU XX<sup>ÈME</sup> CONGRÈS INTERNATIONAL DE TIR À L'ARC  
STOCKHOLM 1959

PART I

At the Palace Hotel, on the 5th August 1959.

*I. Opening of Congress*

At the call-over of names, the following authorized representatives answered:

The Indonesian Archery Association had sent Mr. R. J. Moendjani as an Observer.

M. Oscar Kessels, President, and Mr. Lars Ekegren, General Secretary, were also present, as well as other Members of the Administrative Council.

M. Kessels confirmed that the authorized representatives present were all entitled to vote, and opened the Meeting of the XXth Congress.

*II. Qualification for competing in the World Championship Tournament of 1959*

In the absence of the Treasurer Mr. Torsten Fahlman, the General Secretary read a statement from Mr. Fahlman, dated 31st May 1959, according to which the following National Archery Associations had not paid their annual fee of Swedish Crowns 200: Canada, Cuba, Finland, France, India, Japan, Mexico and Turkey. Some of these Associations — among them India — had paid in the meantime, and the rest of those present promised to pay without any delay.

France and Poland had not sent in the names of their competitors on time. Czechoslovakia had sent a man instead of a woman. USA had added one man after the draw for positions had taken place. Because of the late distribution of the new Constitution and Rules, Congress decided to accept these entries this year. But such entries would not be accepted in the future.

After some discussion Congress decided that all Nations present were entitled to compete in the World Championship Tournament of 1959.

*III. Affiliation of new National Archery Association*

The General Secretary reported that the National Archery Association of Indonesia had formally asked for affiliation, and that all conditions had been fulfilled. Belgium and Sweden supported the request. Indonesia was unanimously affiliated.

*II. Faculté de participer au tournoi de Championnat du Monde 1959.*

En l'absence du Trésorier Mr. Torsten Fahlman, le Secrétaire-Général, donna lecture d'un rapport de Mr. Fahlman, en date du 31 mai 1959, selon lequel les Fédérations Nationales de Tir à l'Arc suivantes n'avaient pas payé leur cotisation annuelle de 200 Cour. Suédois: Canada, Cuba, Finlande, France, Inde, Japon, Mexique et Turquie. — Plusieurs de ces Fédérations parmi lesquelles: Inde, avaient payé entretemps et les autres présents promirent de payer sans délai ultérieur.

La France et la Pologne n'avaient pas soumis les noms de leurs compétiteurs en temps utile. La Tchéco-Slovaquie avait envoyé un homme au lieu d'une femme. USA avait ajouté un homme après le tirage au sort. En raison de la distribution tardive de la nouvelle Constitution et du nouveau règlement le Congrès décida d'accepter ces erreurs cette fois-ci. Cependant des erreurs similaires ne seraient plus acceptées à l'avenir.

Après une brève discussion le Congrès constata que toutes les nations présentes seraient admises à participer au Tournoi de Championnat du Monde 1959.

*III. Affiliation de Nouvelles Fédérations de Tir à l'Arc.*

Le Secrétariat-Général rapporta que la Fédération Nationale de Tir à l'Arc d'Indonésie avait formellement demandé son affiliation et qu'elle avait rempli les conditions requises. La Belgique et la Suède appuyèrent la demande. L'Indonésie fut acceptée à l'unanimité.

M. Kessels greeted warmly the 30th Member Association and congratulated Mr. Moendjani, the present Indonesian Observer.

#### *IV. Report on the World Championship Tournament of 1959, and election of the "Commission Technique"*

Mr. Lars Ekegren, President of the Organizing Committee, gave a short description on the arrangements for the 1959 World Championship Tournament. He also reported that the Team Captains had nominated the Technical Commission for the Tournament as follows: Mr. Tomas Bolle, Sweden (President), Mrs. Inger Frith, Great Britain, and M. Jiri Bastar, Czechoslovakia.

M. Kessels expressed his gratitude to Mr. Ekegren and his Organizing Committee for the work they had done.

## X. Elections

Voting took place by secret ballot. The votes were scrutinized by M. Fagoaga, Spain, Mr. Sommer, Holland, and Mr. Bolle, Sweden.

### a) FITA Vice Presidents 1959—1963

Mrs. Inger Frith, Great Britain, M. Roger Bédøy, France, and M. Jiri Bastar, Czechoslovakia, were elected.

### b) FITA Vice President 1959—1961

Mr. Hisashi Murakami, Japan, was elected.

### c) Other Members of the FITA Administrative Council 1959—1963

Mr. Väinö Ansala, Finland, Mr. Tomas Bolle, Sweden, Mr. Arild Honne, Norway, and Miss Verrel Weber, USA, were elected.

## XI. The FITA Constitution and Rules

The new FITA Constitution and Rules were unanimously accepted. M. Kessels and Mr. Ekegren thanked Mrs. Frith and her Committee for their efficient work.

Congress decided that the Committee shall carry on. In the future all Congress Motions shall be sent to Mrs. Frith in order to get the Committee's opinion before the Congress decisions.

## XII. Motions

*Belgium: The O. K. Round.* Motion withdrawn.

*Finland: The Big Game Round.* A Field Archery Committee was formed, consisting of Mr. Håkan Blechingberg, Sweden (Chairman), Mr. Väinö Ansala, Finland, and Mr. Clayton Shenk, USA. This Committee to study Field Archery problems and make recommendations to the Oslo Congress in 1961. The National Archery Associations are invited to give the Committee their points of view. No decision about the Finnish Motion.

*New Zealand: Sighter ends in World Championship Tournaments.* Congress did not accept this Motion.

*New Zealand: All shooting simultaneously — only three archers to each target.* Congress did not accept this Motion.

*Poland: Junior World Championship to be arranged.* Congress did not accept this Motion.

*Sweden: Memo for Organizers of World Championship Tournaments.* Withdrawn.

## XIII. The Olympic Amateur Rule

Congress decided that all National Archery Associations shall send their Amateur Rules to M. Auguste Hansen, in order to make it possible for him to find a solution which should satisfy the International Olympic Committee. This important matter has to be decided about at the Oslo Congress in 1961. Therefore the Amateur Rules should be sent to Mr. Hansen without any delay.

## XIV. Olympic Report

M. Kessels reported about the IOC Meeting in Munich this year. The Report was unanimously accepted.

Congress decided that FITA shall join the "Union des Fédérations Internationales".

The General Secretary reported on the archery preparations for the 1964 Olympic Games in Tokyo, Japan. The Japanese Archery Association will prepare a special archery ground. They will also suggest to the IOC that archery be permitted as an Olympic Ladies' Sport and that the participation from each Member Nation should be the same as at World Championship Tournaments. The Report was unanimously accepted.

## X. Elections.

## XI. Constitution et Règlement FITA.

## XIII. Règlement Amateur Olympique.

Le Congrès décida que toutes les Fédérations Nationales de Tir à l'Arc devront soumettre leurs Règlements Amateur, à Mr. Auguste Hansen, afin de lui permettre de trouver une solution donnant satisfaction au Comité International Olympique. ## XV. International Radio and Television Rule

The Frith Committee was asked to study the problem and to suggest a Rule to the 1961 Congress in Oslo, Norway.

## XVI. Reports

*The Stoke Mandeville Prize.* Mrs. Frith was asked to hand over this prize — a tankard of pewter — to the Organizers of The Stoke Mandeville Games, which she promised to do.

*International Awards.* There were no suggestions, but Congress would be glad to make awards to some of the Organizers of the 1959 World Championship Tournament later on.

*The 1958 FITA Mail-Match.* The General Secretary's Report was unanimously accepted.

## XVII. The 1961 World Championship Tournament

The New Zealand protest against Norway as organizer of the 1961 World Championship Tournament was withdrawn.

Mr. Honne cordially invited the archers of the world to this Tournament, and was thanked by M. Kessels. The General Program is not yet ready.

# HUNGARIAN ARCHERY

By Dr. G. Fábián

The Hungarian bow and arrow, and the Hungarian archery, are about 1.000 years old. Unfortunately there is a gap from the 17th century up to recent years in the practise of this ancient sport.

The Hungarian tribes, as a semi-nomadic people, won our present country in the year of 896 a.C. with their superior technique of warfare, in that the chief trick was the excellent riding and long lange shooting from horseback with bow and arrows.

Our archeologists have excavated many graveyards from the time of the conquest, and it was an interesting work to establish the type of the original Hungarian bow. This was possible by means of the discovery that our warriors covered the handle and sometimes the horns of their bows with thin white bone plates.

From these typical bone plates Dr. Sebestyén, an archeologist, created the hypothetical form and proportions of the ancient bow. Later on Mr. K. Jakus and I myself made some reconstructions of »living old Hungarian bows». It is interesting that both of us, working separately with a little different raw material, reached the same form — a reflexed composite bow, very similiar to the inner Asiatic Mongolian type of bows.

Mr. Jakus elaborated the manufacturing of the sport type of the Hungarian bows, and he is now our best teacher in the shooting technique, too. He is our senior Bowman, 67 years old, enthusiastic and energetic.

During the first period of modern Hungarian archery, 1932 — 1944, a Championship Tournament was held every year, and Mr. L. Szánthó was the Champion each time. Other prominent archers were Messrs. J. Gerencsér, G. Szabados, K. Jakus, L. Seper. Mr. Szabados was killed in the second world war.

In 1944 — 1955 there was an interval in the archery activities. But here and there the archers preserved some equipment, and in 1955 a club named Nomád was started in Budapest.

Enthusiastic Members of this club, Mr. L. Bolba, Mr. G. Moldoványi, Mr. J. Kerinczy and Miss G. Frischer invited Mr. F. Hadas (Czechoslovakia) to make a visit to Hungary, in order to teach us the modern shooting technique. We are very much indebted to Mr. Hadas, who gave us a great help for our further work.

In the beginning of 1957 the Hungarian archers got an independant society named the Hungarian Archery Association. This society was accepted by the reorganized National Sport Office and the National Olympic Committee. So we have a state support, too. The Hungarian Archery Association is directed by a Council. Nine archery clubs are Members of the Association.


A course for archery instructors and umpires has been arranged by our General Secretary, Mr. F. Springer. This course included as well the history of archery, its technique etc. as practical things like the arrangements on the field, the knowledge of the FITA Rules — as far as known — the shooting practice etc. Lectures were given by Mr. Hadas and our elder archers.

In this short half year period the chief task has been to obtain modern equipment, and to learn the sound shooting technique and style. Today there are still many difficulties left and the shortage of good equipment has prevented our archers from reaching good scores, and from taking part in the World Championship Tournament. But we hope for the future.
