The election of Mrs. I. K. Frith as President of F.I.T.A. at the 1961 Congress held in Oslo, will have been received with great satisfaction by archers from all Member Associations.

The occasion was a memorable one, marking the first time that such an honour has been accorded by F.I.T.A. to a lady, giving recognition, both to the tremendous amount of work that she has done for International Archery and, more personally, to the high esteem in which she is held by all.

Mrs. Frith has been a tireless and devoted worker for Archery in all its spheres, but it is in the International Field that she has become so well known and liked.

She is an International Archer, having represented Great Britain in the World Championships of 1950 and 1952.

In subsequent years Mrs. Frith attended World Championships as the Manager of the British Team, as the representative of Great Britain and of a number of other Member Associations at the Congresses, becoming one of the best known personalities in International Archery.

In 1958 she became the Chairman of a Committee of three, elected for the purpose of re-drafting the new F.I.T.A. Constitution and Rules. This Committee functioned so successfully that it was decided to maintain it as a Standing Committee on Rules.

Mrs. Frith has a profound knowledge of Archery, this, together with her keen sense of perception and of forthright expression of opinion in Congress, is greatly respected and admired.


Welcome to Finland

It is thought that Member Associations might like to see the emblem that had been specially commissioned by the Grand National Archery Society for use on all World Championship publicity matter. Illustrated above, therefore, is a black and white version of the design which depicts, in full colour, the national flags of all Affiliated Associations as the fletchings on arrows arranged in a circle around a neutrally coloured target face, on which is super-imposed in gold the Association's medieval archer motif.

The following reports were presented to and accepted by the 1961 Congress.

RAPPORT DU PRESIDENT

Si nous avons eu le grand plaisir de nous rendre compte, que le tir à l'arc est en plein essor dans le monde entier, nous avons eu dans le courant du mois de juin, votre secrétaire-général, et moi-même, un moment d'abbatement.

En effet, les représentants F.I.T.A. ayant fait le long déplacement d'Athènes à l'occasion des réunions du CIO, afin de mettre toutes les chances d'introduction du tir à l'arc de leur côté, ont appris laconiquement, que sur les 22 sports olympiques, 20 étaient admis, et que le tir à l'arc et le handball étaient exclus des Jeux de Tokio 1964. Et ce sans dire le pourquoi ni le comment. Essayez donc d'expliquer cela, à l'homme de la rue !

D'un autre côté nous avons eu le plaisir d'entregistrer la rentrée dans la grande famille F.I.T.A. de l'Indonésie.

Le XX^e Championnat du monde eut lieu dans la magnifique ville de Stockholm du 9 au 14 août 1959. Le nombre total des compétiteurs fut: 34 dames et 82 messieurs, répartis sur 16 pays.

The Commission is satisfied that all the distances were correct as were targets and target faces used.

An examination of the shooting equipment of competitors was made, and the Technical Commission has no doubt that in every respect it complied with F.I.T.A. regulations.

XXIst WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP TOURNAMENT

9th—14th August.

OSLO, 1961

Organised on behalf of F.I.T.A. by the Norwegian Archery Association for the third time—to coincide with the Centenary of Organised Sport in Norway—this 21st Championship will be remembered for the efficient organisation, the good weather (it rained for only two short periods during the four days), the good fellowship, the high scores made and the records broken. 15 countries had sent teams and altogether 40 ladies and 86 gentlemen took part.

Whilst the Bislet Stadium was eminently suitable from the spectators point of view, it was somewhat on the small size for such a large number of archers. In consequence the targets were grouped in pairs touching each other with barely 18 inches between each pair. The targets at each end were, in fact, on the cinder running track and straw mats were laid behind them to stop loose arrows. Behind the shooting line was a newly constructed wooden shelter extending the full length of the line and this added to the comfort and

protection of the competitors and their equipment. Scoring was carried out by Air Force National Servicemen who did the job very efficiently.

At 9.30 a.m. on the Thursday morning, all the teams marched into the arena, each behind its National flag. Mr. Arild Honne, on behalf of the Norwegian A.A. welcomed all the archers to Oslo and to the Tournament. He was followed by President Oscar Kessels who, at the conclusion of his remarks, officially declared the 21st World Championship Meeting open. And so started four days of tenseness, drama and excitement during which the standard of shooting was very high.

Eighty-six scores of 1000 or over were recorded, 29 by ladies and 57 by gentlemen. This represented more or less exactly one-third of the possible.

Joe Thornton, the New Champion, broke the World Record by 15 points and the Championship Record by 63 points. No fewer than six ladies broke the then existing Championship Record. Three ladies' teams broke the existing Championship Record, and the World Record was broken after the first F.I.T.A. only to be broken again on the second F.I.T.A.

Twenty-seven ladies' and seven gentlemen's scores were above the existing Distance Records.

The City of Oslo gave a reception to all the competitors in their magnificent City Hall on the afternoon prior to shooting. A number of sight-seeing tours had been organised when the opportunity was presented of seeing all those things for which Norway is renowned—the famous ski-jump at Holmenkollen, the Kon-Tiki Raft, Viking Ships, the Folk Museum and the Vigeland's Sculpture Park and these enabled the competitors to relax after their four days of concentration.

A COMPETITOR LOOKS BACK

There are so many wonderful memories which I carried away from the 1961 World Archery Championships in Oslo, that it is rather difficult to sort them out. The preparations for a trip to any country other than your own are accompanied by much excitement and anticipation. This was accentuated by the fact that the U.S. eliminations to choose the F.I.T.A. team are held about six weeks prior to the departure of the team. This trip in many cases would be the only opportunity for some team members to visit a country far removed from the North American continent.

On our arrival in Oslo the skies seemed to clear, being a forerunner of the co-operation the weather was to give us throughout the days of shooting. The pagentry and colour of the opening and closing ceremonies aroused a sensation of great pride. The fact that you are representing your country gives you added purpose and determination.

This being my first International Tournament there were many things that particularly impressed me: the fact that you had two shooting companions from different countries, the daily distribution of the accumulative shooting scores, and the magnificent tension and excitement which accompanied the regular posting of scores and announcements of the standings. The public attention which the tournament evoked again impressed the team as it had U.S. teams in the past.

The feeling the team had when it left Oslo was expressed very well by Sigrid Johansson, former World Champion, when attending our National Championships this past summer, "In looking back on the tournaments I have attended, it is certainly not the scores which linger in my memory. These were very important however at the time of the shooting as well they should be. The best remembrances I have are of the friends I made, old acquaintances being renewed, and new ones being formed." The team felt that the events, in addition to the tournament, that the host country had made available to us, left us with the impression that we had experienced for a short period of time the true atmosphere of the city of Oslo and of her people. We hope we can do the same as the host country in 1965.

MR. LARS EKEGREN

General Secretary, 1949-1961

LARS EKEGREN entered the International scene as Captain of the Swedish Team at the World Championships in Prague in 1947. He was elected General Secretary of F.I.T.A. at the Paris Congress in 1949, and held this position for 12 years—eight with Mr. H. Kjellson as President and four with Mr. O. Kessels.

At the F.I.T.A. Congress at Helsinki in 1955 he was awarded a Gold Plaque for International merits and in 1959 he received the highest decoration of the Swedish Archery Society—the Clas Lundin Medal.

When he took office in 1949 there were only nine members of the International Federation but when he retired in 1961 there were 30. During the time he was Secretary, Ekegren introduced 'F.I.T.A. Information Sheets', took the initiative in starting the Mail Matches,

and the summing up of motions that were distributed to Member Nations prior to Congresses.

In co-operation with Bo Ekeland and others on the Olympic Committee he did a lot of hard work in getting archery re-introduced as an Olympic sport.

In Sweden, he has been Chairman of the Stockholm Archery Club, Public Relations Officer to the National Federation (1947-1960) and President from 1960. He has been a most efficient radio and television commentator to many archery Tournaments.

When he worked with me he was always very keen and capable, full of good ideas and with much energy and interest helped to bring archers together throughout the world into one single family. The Federation lost a good man when Ekegren retired.

MR. TORSTEN FAHLMAN

Treasurer, 1955-1961

REPORT BY THE TECHNICAL COMMISSION OF THE XXth World Championship in Stockholm 1959

The Technical Commission, composed of Mrs. Inger Frith, England, Mr. Jiri Bastar, Czechoslovakia, and the under-signed, elected at a meeting of the Team Captains on 5th of August, has the following to report:

All the distances were measured as correct. The targets used were measured and found correct (all large targets were composed of 2 pieces and a few were found not to be put accurately together and were discarded.)

The competitors' archery equipment was examined each day before shooting and found correct according to the rules.

The slowness of shooting was observed. Several archers were timed and some warned successfully through their Team Captains.

A big part of the competition was televised and we are satisfied it did not interfere with the shooting.

No protests have been received and the highest standard of sportsmanship was shown by the competitors.

The organization of the tournament was excellent in details.

The Technical Commission recommend that the Congress confirm the results obtained in the XXth World Championship Tournament.

Mr. C. W. NETTLETON

CHARLES WILLIAM NETTLETON died on 13th Sept. 1962, in his 92nd year. He was until a few years ago a very familiar figure at British Tournaments in all parts of the country and until ill-health prevented him a very sought after judge. He was also known the World over amongst Top Archers as he was present at all World Championships and Congress Meetings from 1932-1952 and in these years always accompanied by his wife, who was a great International Archer in her own right. She died in 1954. Till the very last he had International Archery very particularly at heart. He was an unfailing supporter of our International Teams.

He was an Honorary Vice-President of Federation Internationale de Tir à l'Arc, The Grand National Archery Society, The Southern Counties Archery Society and the Royal Toxophilite Society.

We are proud of his unfailing interest in Archery, when we know how many other Sports he had taken active part in. These included cycling (put up records), riding, curling, skiing, polo and what was the biggest rival to Archery, climbing, for he had been a Member of the Alpine Club in England for more than 60 years, and had climbed the Matterhorn and Mont Blanc as well as many other peaks.

His many friends the World over will miss him, but his name will live in Archery history and in many Challenge Trophies bearing the name NETTLETON.

May we bring together again those two names Mr. and Mrs. Nettleton, which for so many of us for so many years were unseparable, by quoting with little change what was said in Mrs. Nettleton's Obituary in 1954:—Mr. and Mrs. Nettleton will ever remain in our minds as the perfect symbol of the Motto which we archers in England have adopted as our own: Union, True Heart and Courtesy. They sincerely and successfully lived each one of these three attributes and those words remain to us an undying memorial of that Great Little Lady and Grand Old Gentleman.

Mr. HENRY KJELLSON

HENRY KJELLSON, Honorary President of F.I.T.A. and Honorary President of the Swedish National Archery Association, died suddenly after an operation at Borås, Sweden, on 1st November, 1962. He was born in 1891.

More than 30 years ago he joined the Swedish Archery movement. In 1934 he became Champion of the World at Bastad. For many years he was Chairman of the Stockholm Archery Club. When the Swedish National Archery Association was established in 1940 he became its first President. When he retired in 1960, he was in possession of the highest distinctions of the National Archery Association and of the National Sports Federation.

In 1946 he was elected Vice-President of F.I.T.A., and in 1949 its President. He retained that position until 1957. In 1955 he was awarded the highest F.I.T.A. distinction—the Gold Plaque for International Merits.

His many technical researches on archery material have been of great importance to equipment manufacturers all over the world. He was one of the constructors of the well-known SEEFAB Steel Bow which opened the gate to sensational scores in the years after the War.

The Founder of the Modern Olympic Games.

Pierre de Coubertin

President International Olympic Committee

1896-1925

Pierre de Fedi, Baron de Coubertin, was born in Paris on January 1st, 1863, and died at Geneva on September 2nd, 1937.

It is a very difficult task to summarize in a few words as active a life and extensive a work as that of Baron de Coubertin.

Very early in life he showed a taste for the study sociology. Giving up the army to which he seemed to of literature, history, and the problems of education and be called by family tradition, renouncing also the political career that was open to him, Pierre de Coubertin at the age of twenty-four decided to promote a vast movement of educational reform, and at twenty-five his work was started, the first formulae set and the preliminary moves achieved. In fact, he had by then already submitted to the Society for the Advancement of the Sciences a number of papers on methods of teaching.

In 1899, at the age of twenty-six, he first had his idea of reviving the Olympic Games, which had been abolished in 394 A.D., apparently for ever. For four years he worked unceasingly to prepare opinion in England, the United States and France for this revival. At last, on November 25th, 1892, during a conference at the Sorbonne, he suggested that the Olympic Games, after a lapse of fifteen centuries, be revived in a modern and international form.

His suggestion was accepted at an international congress on sport that was summoned in 1894 at the same Sorbonne in Paris. Twelve nations were represented, including the United States and England, countries in which the practice of sport was already well developed, and without whose support no such movement of an international character could have been contemplated. During this congress, which lasted eight days, Baron de Coubertin imparted his enthusiasm so forcibly to all those present, that the decision to revive the Olympic Games and to hold them every fourth year, in different countries in turn, was unanimous. A committee (the International Olympic Committee) was formed to look after their development and well-being. Two years later, in 1896, the first Olympic Games of the modern cycle were celebrated in the rebuilt stadium of Athens. The triumphal chariot had been set in motion, and these contests have been held, at four-year intervals, with ever increasing success (except when prevented by war). Later, again following the suggestion of the Baron de Coubertin, a special cycle of Winter Games was instituted and initiated at Chamonix in 1924.

Everyone knows the history of the Games, but what is generally overlooked is the ceaseless labour, the tenacity and the perseverance which the Baron de Coubertin was forced to exert in order to realise, accom-

plish and perfect this vast and important work. It is to him that we owe the whole of the main organisation of the Olympic Games which benefited from his methodical and precise mind and from his wide understanding of the aspirations and needs of youth. He was, in fact, for many years the sole director and so shaped the form and character of the Games. The rules and regulations, and the athlete's oath, came from him, as well as the basic arrangement of the Opening and Closing Ceremonies. In addition, until 1925, he personally presided over the International Olympic Committee and assumed single-handed all the administrative and financial duties connected with this important position.

At present all nations and races are interested and participate in the quadrennial Games. Thanks largely to Baron de Coubertin, the practice of physical education and sport has become popular in all Continents throughout the world, influencing the habits and ways of living with beneficial effect on public health. Therefore it can be truly said that he accomplished a highly humanitarian and social work and may be counted among the great benefactors of mankind. The title of Honorary President of the Olympic Games, which will never be awarded again, was given to him in 1925, when he retired from the Presidency of the International Olympic Committee. It was a well deserved reward for his outstanding activities and efforts during over thirty years at the head of his Committee.

The revival of the Olympic Games was only a small part of Baron de Coubertin's work. In addition to numerous publications dedicated to the technique and the teaching of sport, he was the author of important historical studies, which include a remarkable four-volume universal history, as well as numerous notes, studies and pamphlets on politics, sociology, general teaching, the reform of education, etc. His works total over sixty thousand pages and the catalogue of his publications fills a fourteen-page printed booklet. Counted among the eminent historians of his time, he was a great educator and sociologist as well.

The work of Baron de Coubertin was above all a work of peace and one which will always remain fruitful. His memory will live throughout the world. His body rests in the cemetery of Bois-de-Vaux at Lausanne, Switzerland, where he resided and which became the headquarters of the International Olympic Committee in 1915. In accordance with his will, his heart was buried at Olympia, Greece, in the marble monument commemorating the revival of the Olympic Games.
