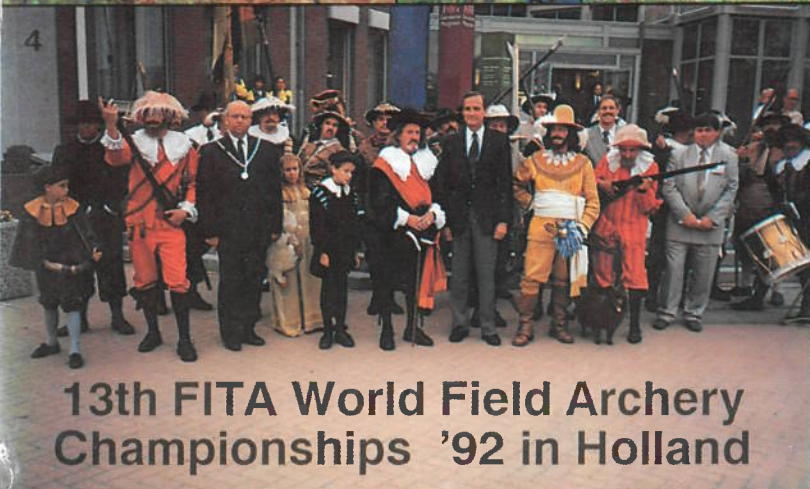
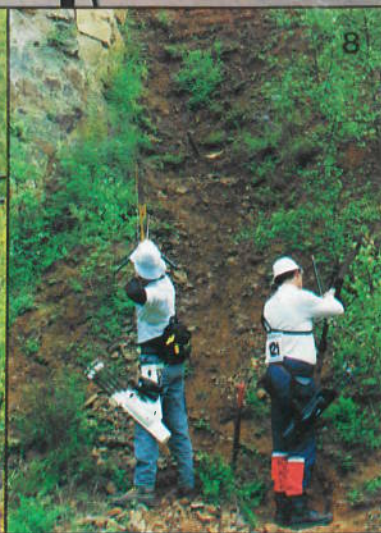

# HOW TO TUNE FOR TOP PERFORMANCE.

Olympic Gold Medalist Jay Barrs discusses his techniques for rough and fine tuning, along with his choice of arrow shafts.

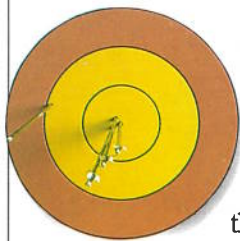
## HOW ACCURATE IS THE BARE SHAFT TECHNIQUE?

Although tuning your bow with the bare shaft technique is satisfactory, I consider it only a rough tune. For the most forgiving tune, here's what I recommend.

At 18 meters, shoot three fletched arrows to get a grouping. Then shoot a bare shaft.

Without fletching, a bare shaft's impact, relative to the fletched arrows, will show exactly how the bow is affecting an arrow's flight.

If the bare shaft is below the group, lower the nocking point. If it's above, raise the nocking point until the bare shaft falls in the group.



Typical bare shaft grouping.

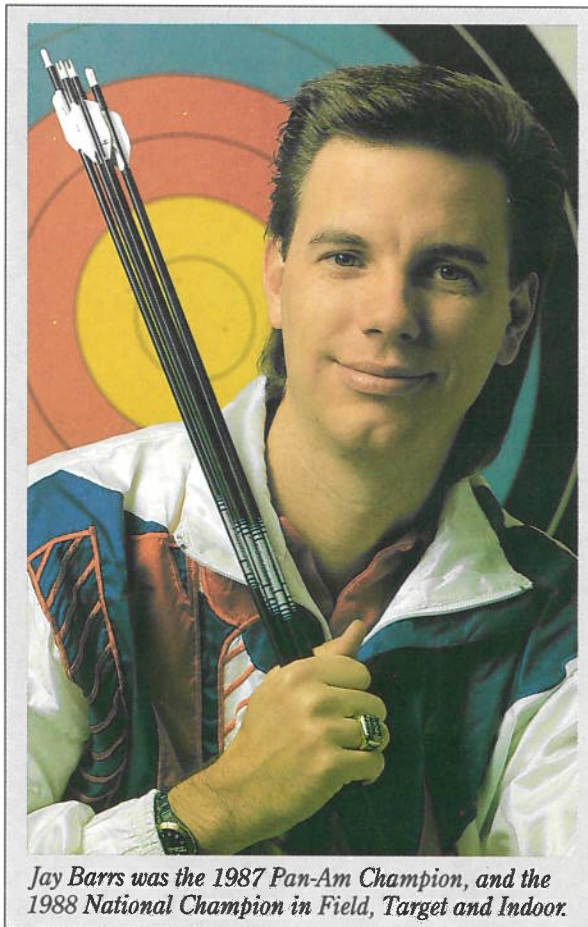
(Left-handers reverse the process.)

Now let's adjust plunger spring tension.

For right-handers: If the bare shaft is to the left, weaken the plunger spring tension (photo). If the bare shaft is to the right, stiffen.

## HOW ABOUT FINE TUNING?

Now move out to 70 or 90 meters and shoot six 6-arrow ends. Chart them on a small target face. Add one-half turn of tension to the plunger and shoot six more ends, charting them on a separate target.

Keep shooting and adding half-turns of tension. Stop when you notice the groups begin to spread out. Now return the spring tension to where you started (after the bare shaft tuning), and loosen the tension one-half turn at a time. Review all your charts. You'll find that one tension setting groups the best. That's where you set the plunger tension.

## SHOULD I RECHECK MY TUNE?

Yes, once your nocking point and plunger are set, go back to 18 meters and repeat the bare shaft test. Most archers

find the bare shaft will not be in the group any more. This is because your fine tuning has found a more forgiving setup. Notice where the bare shaft is in relation to the group. If you ever need to tune your bow quickly, adjust the nocking point and plunger tension so the bare shaft hits in the same location.

It's a long process, but unless you change your setup, you only have to do it once.

## WHAT SHAFTS DO YOU USE?

I shoot the new 470 G-Series Easton A/C/E, 29-7/8" from the throat of the nock to the end of the point. 90-grain points, Spin-Wing® vanes 1-3/4".

The A/C/E offers a cleaner aerodynamic profile. Nock and points are flush with the shaft so you get a more even airflow around the shaft. This makes the A/C/E the most forgiving, most stable, and most accurate arrow I have ever shot.

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# CMC

FITA Ranking list is still under the development and the interest for the list is increasing. Many international media asked FITA for the ranking of our archers. We will work hard to get all the information on results spread out all over the world.

Again, I ask all the Member Associations to send in the filled in question-forms for their archers. If Member Associations cooperate, we will have, in the near future, indoor and field ranking list.

CMC is also working on a handbook about organization. That is a book you could use when organizing a big tournament or our championships. We already have a lot of basic material. CMC will prepare an instruction book for the new FITA Member Associations.

This year is an Olympic year. Take the advantage of that and work hard together with media in your country. The more media write and speak about archery, the more interest will be shown for our sport. If we have luck it will be an archer lighting the Olympic flame in Barcelona. Not with a torch but with an fiery arrow. Better promotion for archery is hard to get.

# New Rounds in FITA

In FITA Official Bulletin No. 43 under this title, late Don Stamp proposed action in finding new Rounds in order to make the archery more popular and attractive. This encouraged the world of archery to think about new disciplines. Here is an example: **CAB 900**

Compagnia Arcieri Bassano from Bassano del Grappa (VI) - Italy will organize the second GRAND PRIX Citta di Bassano on Sunday, September 20 1992 in the beautiful surroundings of Parco Ragazzi del '99. The event is on purpose out of the national programme enabling thus the organizer to experiment with new types of tournaments. This year there are some very interesting novelties.

CAB 900 - (it is the name proposed by the organizer) united in itself, out of three types of events so far held, what was the best. The tournaments were loved and attended by a lot of spectators.

The number of participants at one target further will be four. The total number of arrows will be 90, as in Round 900, in order to get a shorter competition or some more time for possible semi-finals or finals. The distances to shoot are 90, 60 and 30 meters for men. Thus the tradition and beauty of FITA's 90 meter has been preserved and distances at 70 and 50 meters, which are very much alike are thrown out.

In women the distances are 70, 50 and 30 meters. The diameters of the targets are also a great novelty. At long distances the archers shoot 6 arrows in 4 minutes. In free-style the targets are 122 cm in diameter and in compound the diameter is 80 cm. At middle distances archers shoot 6 arrows in 4 minutes top. In free-style the targets are 80 cm in diameter but in compound the archer shoots into 2 targets 60 cm in diameter.

A serious damages on targets and arrows at short distances (30 meters) contributed to the following decisions: in men free-style 3 arrows in 2 minutes at two faces of 60 cm in diameter, and for compound archers it will be 3 arrows in 2 minutes at four faces of 40 cm.

The possibility of the two days event was studied (eg. Saturday afternoon and Sunday morning). In that case the first two distances would be shot during the first day. At the end of that first day a classification would be made, according to which the programme 30 meters would take place. This would be the first competition on the second day.

At the end of the 30 meter distance event (10x3 arrows) it is not necessary to make the final classification list, but just relative per target.

So we have the placement of the first at the target, second, third and probably fourth. At the end of the 60 meter event - semi-finals, each target has its own placement for four competitors (from the first to the fourth).

Places for the 90 meter distance - finals (4x6 archers) will be as follows: The last at each target goes to the target lowered in number except the one at target no. 1. All the others remain at the same targets.

At the end of 90 meter finals a general classification list will be made according to the following rules: The last placed on each target leaves its place to the first at the lower target (except the first on target no. 1 and the last on target no. 8).

After this exchange on target no. 1 we have archers placed from the first to the fourth place, on target two we have from the fifth to the eighth etc.

The advantages of this type of event, although it looks complex, are various; after the first day of competition, the last ranked can still win (eliminating thus the uncomfortable feeling of "less good" competitors seeing the others unreachable after first distances).

Although it is an eliminy kind of event, all the competitors can shoot all their arrows. The second day of the event the competitor tries to surpass the direct rivals on his target.

A computer is not needed for the organizer of the event, and after the first day there is enough time to prepare target at 30 meter.

The second day there should be only one board with target numbers at which are also put the names of the archers.

The organizers from Compagnia Arcieri Bassano are convinced that this new type could have a great success and that it could be very qualitative alternation to FITA event. Come, you are cordially invited.

It seems, that SKI-ARC as an event, which have more and more followers, will start with its world and regional championships.

Jay Barrs, current Olympic Champion, led the field for the first two distances in the Open Round, but a couple of bad arrows at 50 and 30 gave him a 1327 which dropped him th 3rd place behind Yamamoto from Japan with a 1335 and Lim of Korea with a 1333.

The Finals medal winners for the men were Lim Hee-Sik of Korea - Gold, Hiroshi Yamamoto of Japan - Silver and Andreas Lippoldt of Germany - Bronze.

The Team events brought even more reaction from the crowd. The newly reduced 3 minutes for 3 archers to shoot 9 arrows did not seem to cause any problems. Indeed, our stopwatch showed that no Team member even came close to maximum time (within 8 seconds) and the scores were at record level. In fact, there wasn't a single arrow out of the gold for the last 9 arrows shot by the Gold medal Korean Men's Team (see photo) and they shot an incredible 251 points out of a possible 270 at 70 metres in that very short period of time. Spain took the Team Silver and Germany the Bronze. On the Women's side, Korea took the Team Gold, Germany the Silver and China the Bronze.

Of great surprise to the writer was the fact that many archers in the Team Finals rotated after every arrow rather than after their three arrows as was expected. I suppose the thinking was that they each had more time between their individual shots. Who knows? Our new Olympic Round gives the possibility of all kinds of Team strategy. Truly, it is a new game and Archery has entered a new and exciting phase of its development!

## In Memoriam Don Stamp

On the morning of December the 5th., 1991 International Judge Don Stamp passed away.

I know that many of you knew him as a great friend, and I would like to share my memory of him with you. Many people will write fine eulogies to this outstanding and unforgettable man. For almost forty years, he was truly a leader in our sport not only in his beloved GNAS but also in FITA.

Don became a member of FITA Council in 1987 and would have remained a senior officer of our Federation for as long as he wished to serve. Early in 1991 knowing that his developing illness was limiting his ability to fulfil his responsibilities, he resigned from all of his portfolios. In his sensible honest way, he simply did not want to delay the many projects that he was involved in. Projects that will forever carry his mark. FITA in respect to his wishes, accepted his resignation. His thoughts as always were for Archery.

I could go on for many pages and not do his achievements justice. I do however, wish to share with you the great respect and love I felt for the man.

Some twenty or more years ago Don came into my life. I do not recall exactly when, it seems as though he was always there. For all of those years I sought his council on any matter that I could not resolve in my own mind, and many that I just wanted reassurance on. I am sure at different times we discussed almost every rule, championship and development phase of FITA. Certainly one of the most rewarding experiences Archery ever gave to me was the fourteen years I shared with him on the Constitution and Rules Committee. Don never failed to answer a letter, and several hundred passed between us during that period. Looking back, I can recall quite clearly returning from an extended trip overseas and facing the mountain of mail awaiting me, and shuffling through it looking for, and reading Don's letters first. They always gave me the enthusiasm to respond to the rest. Don quite simply had that effect on almost every one he came in contact with.

Don never allowed politics or prejudices to clutter his common sense. I knew that what ever he said was based solely on his honest and well thought-out consideration on the matter in question. When he resigned from all his positions I could not begin to comprehend the tremendous loss this would be to FITA. I still can not deal with it in my mind or heart.

Don Stamp became a FITA Judge in 1976. Three years later I became the Chairman of this Committee and I make no apology for using him far more often than we should have. We did so because he was the best. He gave our Judge Corps more direction and dignity than you can possibly imagine. Not only because of his knowledge and application of the rules, but because he brought to each committee on which he served a quiet quality that brought out the best in his fellow Judges. He worked as an advanced instructor to a great many of you candidates who followed him, and while he was helpfully showing you the ropes he developed in you a respect and loyalty to the cause that reflects to this day, and always will.

A great many memorable and wonderful meetings were hosted in his room long after the judging work day, and the single malt Scotch he always shared was like him, the best.

I never met a person who did not like and admire Don Stamp. He, like Fred Usher his friend and mine from Canada who passed away a few years ago never left anyone's company but what the person was better for the association. Don had a marvelous sense of humour and I tried many stories on him because his deep rumbling and genuine laughter always gave me pleasure beyond words.

Don, know that the Judges of FITA walk straighter and with more pride because of you. Thank you for sharing your life with us.

## Flaming Arrow

Barcelona, Spain (AP) - A Spanish archer will shoot a fiery arrow 115 feet to ignite the Olympic flame that will burn throughout the summer games, an organizer said today.

The archer, who has not yet been chosen, will stand on the stage holding the Olympic orchestra and chorus and fire his arrow up at the cauldron built atop the stadium.

Assuming he hits the target, the arrow will ignite a gas burner that will feed the flame during the July 25 - August 9 Olympics.

The flame usually is lit by a famous athlete, such as former decathlete Rafer Johnson at the 1984 Los Angeles Games, who ignites the massive fire directly with the Olympic torch.

But an Olympic organizer closely involved with the Opening ceremonies said the honor will fall this summer to one of four Spanish archers still being tested for the job.

The organizer, who asked that his name not be used, said two finalists will be chosen in July and that the actual flame-lighter may not be selected until the last minute.

A Barcelona newspaper, EL PERIODICO, said today that disabled Spanish archer Antonio Rebollo had been chosen to be "The Robin Hood of Barcelona."

The newspaper said Rebollo, whose legs are crippled by childhood polio, was chosen after a series of tests. Rebollo, 36, a Madrid cabinetmaker, won a bronze medal in archery at the 1988 Seoul Paralympics.

The Olympic organizer confirmed Rebollo was one of the four finalists, and that "he's probably had more experience because we used him for many of the tests," but denied the final selection had been made.

The lighting of the flame will occur halfway through the Opening ceremonies on the night of July 25. It will be the culmination of a seven-week journey for the Olympic torch, which will be ignited by the sun June 5 in Olympia, Greece.

The torch will be taken by sea to the Spanish coastal village of Empuries, about 75 miles North of Barcelona, on June 13. Then it will begin a trip around Spain, arriving in Barcelona on July 24. Organizers have not revealed who will run the final leg of the relay, bringing the torch into the stadium to light the arrow.

It will not be necessary for the archer to put his arrow into the cauldron. There will be enough gas in an area above the cauldron for ignition and the cauldron is 10-foot wide.

Just in case the arrow misses, EL PERIODICO reported, police will cordon off an area outside the stadium around the cauldron.



# XIII WORLD FITA FIELD ARCHERY CHAMPIONSHIPS

The hard work which had obviously gone into the staging of this World Championships and the friendliness of the many workers involved, seemed to be overshadowed by the numerous problems which became evident as the tournament progressed. Most of which, but not all, could be attributed to the organization. As an example, there must be sympathy for any harassed organizer when faced with a main hotel cancelling a booking for all its 27 rooms - only two days before the start - in favour of a more profitable client.

The area around Margraten is very picturesque and - for the Netherlands - appears mountainous. There are however very few areas in which to construct a challenging Field Course. What was done here, and with

some ingenuity, was to utilise a Marl Quarry, which created some difficult, if not downright hazardous, shots.

The quarry, being the habitat of some rare and endangered species of amphibians and reptiles, apparently caused some concern to the local environmentalists when they heard of the proposed tournament. It is understood that the organizers had to reassure them that the archers would not inhibit the mating season of the Yellowbellied Fire Toad and other similar creatures which would be allowed to get on with their love-life relatively undisturbed. By definition a quarry will tend to be hazardous and the Courses reflected the nature of the terrain. The following warnings given at the Team Managers' meeting illustrates the care which had to be taken..

"The course is slippery when it is not wet, if it is wet it is extremely slippery". "Target 29 is very dangerous, it is on the edge of a rock so please be extremely careful when withdrawing arrows".

This was even after the Judges had inspected the course and, I understand, had requested a number of safety modifications such as ropes and the cutting of steps on some of the steeper shots.

172 competitors started on Friday in reasonable weather conditions and it is interesting to note that this year the Compounds dominated the entry, the numbers being as follows..

Men's Compound:	-48 (from 17 countries);	Women's Compound:	-23 (from 12 countries);
Men's Freestyle:	-38 (from 16 countries);	Women's Freestyle:	-27 (from 14 countries);
Men's Barebow:	-25 (from 15 countries);	Women's Barebow:	-11 (from 9 countries);

It is an interesting conjecture as to how long it will be before the Compound swamps the entry completely. If the growth rate continues we can look for 100 men and 60 women compound shooters in the 1996

Championships. Shooting was of a creditable standard and demonstrated the fitness of the competitors who were able to scramble around this tough course and still plant arrows in the Spot.

At the end of the first days shooting: in the Men's Freestyle Division (shooting the Unmarked Course) it was J. Barrs (USA) leading with 301, followed by J. P. Laury (FRA) on 291 and A. Rasor (USA) on 290. In 4th place was F. Noteboom (BEL) on 288 and in 5th the ever present Goran Bjerendal (SWE) on 287.

He shoots with Bare Bow bow. By profession he is an insurance salesman. His brother introduced him to archery in 1971. His club is Lindome BK and his greatest achievements are: four times world champion and once the champion at the World Games.

Anders says: "I think the qualifications are O.K. but there should be 2 x 18 targets. In the finals there should be a duel for the first and the second place and another one for the third and the fourth place, i.e. for gold and silver and for the bronze. We should shoot on 12 targets in the finals and that would be real. I appreciate team events very much and in my opinion they should be officially put to the program of the World Championships as well as to the World Games.

On the second day of the tournament the rain came and the forecast of a very slippery hazardous course was proved true. Four targets on the Marked Course were considered too dangerous by the Judges and the initial intention was to delete them from the Course but after a hastily called Team Managers meeting it was decided to re-erect the targets in an area on the floor of the quarry. 1 target on the Unmarked Course was also re-erected in a safer area.

I have nothing but admiration for the competitors who scrambled from Post to Post in atrocious conditions. The resident doctor was called out to an injured archer who it was rumoured had taken a tumble and had broken his leg. This was not confirmed however.

As could be expected, the leading positions had changed in most Divisions and making the Finals as follows... in brackets are shown Unmarked + Marked Courses)

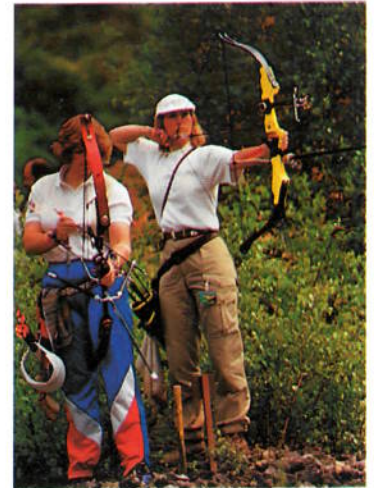
On the Sunday Morning there was a test team event introduced as a demonstration in which five teams took part. From the comments received, this was a great success and it will be arranged again in the 1994 World Field Championships in Vertus (FRA).

The arrival of spectators on Sunday caused yet another problem as the venue was not really suitable for these. There could have been an even greater problem as some spectators began to walk the courses causing the Judges to experience a major case of the "Twitches".

From the comments made it would appear that there is a growing body of opinion in favour of FITA appointing a technical delegate to liaise with those Member Associations entrusted with the organization of FITA Championships, just as is done with the various "Games". This would hopefully avoid some of the problems caused by, in some cases, a lack of experience.

I have in the past referred to the gross variation in the standard of difficulty of some WFC Courses, shown up by those in Kingsclere (Great Britain), Radstadt, Bolzano and Loën.

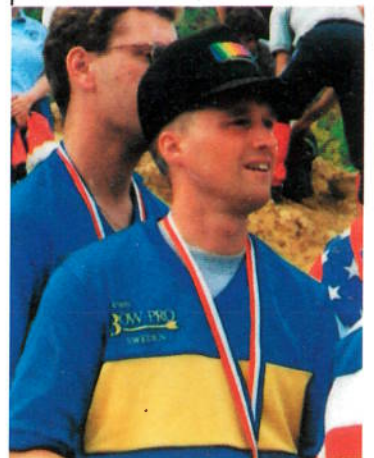
Margraten only emphasised the need for some rough standard, accepting the fact that it would be impossible and undesirable to make any two Courses the same.

## FIELD ARCHERY INFO

by Per E. Bolstad, Chairman, FITA Field Committee

The FITA FIELD COMMITTEE met during the recent World Championships in the Netherlands to discuss the future of FITA Field. Based on approaches from a number of nations and persons we had a long list of items to discuss. Those listed below is what we believe is of general interest to the Field archer.

It was decided to ask the Congress to take away the "sight rule", and leave it open to the archers how they judge the distance on the unmarked round. We suggest to prohibit rangefinders of any kind, otherwise the archer can do what he likes - within the time limit.

We would like to point out that the distances on the Forest Round, the unmarked field and the marked field course are made in such a manner that they often can be combined, i.e. on one target the blue and red peg may be placed side by side, on another the red and yellow may be

combined, and on yet another all three may be on the same distance. You may combine the posts as you like provided you stick to the distances given and the rule about average distances. This should make life easier for the coursemakers.

In the FITA Rule Book there is one misprint which you should be aware of: (page II/6/9)

The size of the inner ring for animal targets is:

Dia 7,5 cm CORRESPONDING to dia 20 cm on the unmarked field

" 15,0 cm " " " 40 cm

" 22,5 cm " " " 60 cm

" 30,0 cm " " " 80 cm

We plan to make a FITA Field Book describing how to shoot Field and how to make courses and arrange tournaments, with check lists on "everything". If any of you already have done something similar, we would be happy to have a copy.

In the future we plan to involve the Field Committee in the arrangement of FITA World Championships by letting a member of the committee be delegated to work with the organizers, both prior to the application and again before the tournament. This way we hope to help the organizers run a smooth arrangement, and by means of the above mentioned Field Book make courses that are acceptable to most competitors.

The Arrowhead Badges are currently achieved by shooting a 144 arrow course, or combining two 72 arrows tournaments. We will ask the Congress to change this to be on a FITA Field Round of 72 arrows only, since this is a very popular round in most countries.

The TEAM FINALS test competition which was tried in the WC seemed to be fairly well accepted. Since it was a French proposal we will ask France to propose a motion for the Congress which will cover such an event. During our meeting it was also decided how the number of participants to the World Games should be divided.

The number of archers:

36 ladies	60 men
8 bare bow	16 bare bow
16 freestyle	20 freestyle
12 compound	24 compound

Basically, the countries attending the World Championships will have the possibility of sending one archer for the division they participated in, in the Netherlands.

In Bare Bow ladies the countries ranked as the first 8 in accordance with the placing of their individual archers, will be invited.

In the other divisions there may be a small extra lot which may be divided in accordance with the above and/or to countries that did not participate in the World Games.

The World Games has previously paid for the competitors stay when attending the Games. Please note that this is not the case this time. Be aware that this time the respective countries must pay everything by themselves.

Besides what is mentioned above we also addressed many of the current rules in order to rewrite them for better understanding for judges and competitors.

Please note that the Field Committee welcomes ideas for improving the Field Rounds, and also note that the Congress has asked everybody that wants to send motions to the Congress to canalize these, if possible, through the corresponding committee.

We are still waiting for some nations to return the Field questionnaire which we have sent to all "Field nations" as well as being distributed at the World Championships. We would very much appreciate to have these back with your comments. This is your chance to influence on future Field, so please use it.

# XIII european & mediterranean target archery championships , malta 1992

On Monday, June 22nd, at six p.m., the Opening Ceremony started including 32 countries who took part at the XIII European and Mediterranean Championships in Target Archery on Malta. At this Championships 59 women and 92 men took part, which was the highest number of participants as well as countries ever since.

At the head of the parade was the military band, followed by the FITA flag, which was accompanied by the winners of the XII Championships C. Nasaridze and S. Zabrodsky. After them the teams were marching in alphabetic order and at the end were the organizers. It was an impressive sight to see such a large number of countries and participants, among whom some were here for the first time, as for instance Croatia, Estonia and Slovenia.

After the Welcoming Speech by Dr. Raphael Patiniott, the President of the Malta Archery Association, Mr. François de Massary spoke in the name of FITA. He was followed by Dr. Michael Frendo (minister for Youth and Arts, responsible also for Sports), and at the end the President of Malta H.E. Dr. Vincent Tabone welcomed everybody and opened the competition. The FITA flag was dipped with the sounds of fanfare. Joanna Agius (Malta) took the oath in the name of all competitors and Kenan Eratalay (TUR) in the name of all judges. After the sounds of the Maltese anthem the teams left the stadium and the military band performed a show.

On Tuesday, June 23rd, the competition on long distances started. A strong wind disturbed the competitors and after a few rather sunny days the sky was cloudy and there were occasional rains. Everybody was trying to enter the final competition, that is, to enter among the first 24. Unfortunately, some participants dropped out after the first distance. For women: 1. KURIVISHVILI (CIS) 311, 2. WILLIAMSON (GBR) 304, 3. NOWICKA (POL) 303, 24. DJERF (SWE) 282. For men: 1. TOFT (DEN) 299, 2. SIZOV (CIS) 299, 3. VAZQUEZ (ESP) 295, and 24. UNBEKAND (FRA) 276.

The computers were out of order while the flags worked perfectly. After distance of 60 meters for women the leader was KURIVISHVILI (CIS) with 617, 2. ARZANIKOVA (CIS) 616, 3. DJERF (SWE) 603 and 24. IORIATTI (ITA) 578. After 70 meter distance for men 1. SIZOV (CIS) 613, 2. POIKOLAINEN (FIN) 604, 3. VAZQUEZ (ESP) 604 and 24. KOLESNIK (ISR) 580. Kolesnik is now in Israel and Nasaridze in Turkey.

On Wednesday, June 24th, 50 meter and 30 meter distances were on schedule. It was the last chance for some to enter the first 24 places. Some lost hope and interest for further competition. For women: 1. ARZANIKOVA (CIS) 931, 2. KURIVISHVILI (CIS) 921, and 3. TESTA (ITA) 919 and 24. ALTINKAYNAK (TUR) 870. For men: 1. SIZOV (CIS) 942, 2. POIKOLAINEN (FIN) 938, 3. VAZQUEZ (ESP) 931 and 24. LIPPOLDT (GER) 897. The qualification tournament at 30 meters ended with a lot of surprise owing to the strong wind which was constantly blowing throughout two days of the tournament (see the results on page 11).

On Thursday, June 25th, 1/8 and 1/4 finals were shot. The temperature was 40 C in shade, while the wind was very strong and unfortunately rather changeable. Only the best competitors were outstanding. This was a rather unfortunate morning for friendly Poles.

After 1/4 final competition for women the following competitors dropped out: HARRIS (GBR), DJERF (SWE), ELASVIRTA (FIN), VALEEVA (CIS), AALTONEN (FIN) and KISS (HUN) and for men after shoot-off GAMMELGAARD (DEN) 20 GROV (NOR) 23, TERRY (GBR), KOLESNIK (ISR), SIZOV (CIS) PARENTI (ITA) and MENENDEZ (ESP).

On Friday, June 26th, semi-final competition took place. The question was who would enter the final competition. The wind in spite of its smaller intensity had an influence upon the shots. The competitors who were faster and more determined had better results. In women the following competitors dropped out: TESTA (ITA), BONAL (FRA), BADMACIRENOVA (CIS) and SJÖWALL (SWE). 2 (CIS), 2 (TUR) and 1 (GBR), (FRA) (POL) (GER) continued the competition. In men dropped out: VAZQUEZ (ESP), HOLGADO (ESP), VERMEIREN (BEL) and TOFT (DEN). 2 (CIS), 2 (FIN) and 1 (FRA), (NOR), (GER) and (GBR) continued the competition. At noon the wind chased the clouds and there were sunny and shadowy intervals, which had an influence on the finalists but the best were going to win. ## UNION SEMINAR

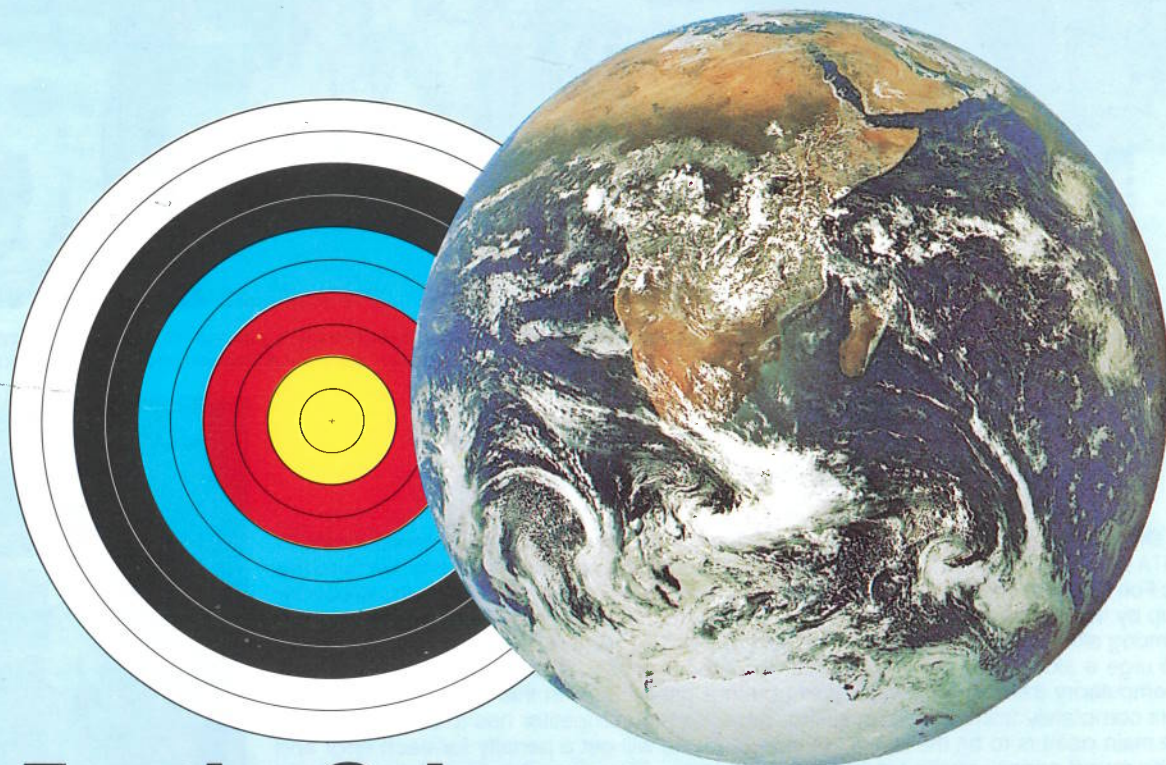

This gives me a lot of hope for the Olympics in Barcelona. I play basketball when I have time, because I practise archery six days a week. My hobby is cooking. My records are: 70m - 327; 60m - 333; 50m - 330; 30m - 352 and in FITA 1323, in Grand FITA - 337 and in NOR - 110. I think I'll improve them in no time. Some of them, maybe, even at the Olympics, if I'll have some luck."

After the medals were awarded the President of the Organizing Committee Dr. Rafael Patiniott gave a speech. He expressed his gratitude to the Directors of Shooting mr. Skip Phillips (USA) and mr. François Wies (LUX) as well as to all the judges with mr. Kenan Eratalay (TUR) ahead, and to all participants and collaborators of the championship. Then the FITA Vice-President Mr. François De Massary took the stand and thanked the organizer for a successful championship, and the participants for their fair play. To Dr. Rafael Patiniott and his Organizing Committee and other officials were given credit for a successful organization of the championship. He then declared the championship closed and after the fanfare the FITA flag was dipped and handed to Dr. Pavel Jurak, the President of the Czechoslovak Archery Association, the future organizer of the following championships in 1994.

# UNION GRAND PRIX - Rome (ITA)

The second UNION GRAND PRIX Tournament was held in Rome (ITA) from April 1st till April 4th 1992. The European Archery Union has three such tournaments on the programme for this year and this was the first.

It was a very successful spectacle, taking place at the field of Acquacetosa. All the organizers were dressed in FITARCO uniforms making a very good impression and performing a high efficiency. 76 men and 44 women took part in this tournament and they were competing in 17 men and 8 women teams.

The Honorary Committee of GRAND PRIX consisted of very distinguished people like the Mayor of Rome, Franco Carraro and the President of the Italian Olympic Committee, Arrigo Gattai.

Many motives contributed to this tournament to be very interesting. For many competitors it was the first and the last chance to get used to the new rules. The competitors who took part in former test tournaments tried to find tactics for this kind of competition. All of them managed to bring liveliness to this tournament which was of the highest technical quality.

Ginno Mattielli, the President of FITARCO, was personally engaged this project for the Olympic Tournament. Smiling and with great satisfaction, he said that it was the third and the last big tournament, this time held in Italy, in order to define the rules of the New Olympic Round. Everything passed smoothly and attained all set goals: spectacle, speed, great interest and the participation of the spectators specially judging the technical quality of the final results.

For the same reason, Vice-President of FITA, Stan Patterson and member of the FITA Council, the Belgium Raoul Theeuwes, were also present in Rome.

Ole Gammelgaard (DEN) took the first place in the FITA Round with 1314 points. The second was Alessandro Rivolta (ITA) with 1310 points and Terry Simon (GBR) was the third with 1302 points achieving the appropriate FITA STAR badge. Some distinguished archers were also present, like young and perspective Dutch Verstege, the outdoor and indoor world record holder, then granite German Lippoldt always at the top and French Flute, the current indoor champion of the world.

In women Zuhra Oktem (TUR), the bronze medal owner from the '91 World Championships held in Krakow, was first with 1278 points. The second was Severine Bonal (FRA) with 1270 points and the third was Marion Wagner (GER) with 1264 points. In the Men's and Women's finals of the New Olympic Round Italians Andrea Parenti and Maria Rosaria Sepe also participated, strongly cheered by their numerous spectators. But the Danish Ole Gammelgaard won and with his first place he proved that the new rules preserved all the values of the direct matches too. The women winner was Marion Wagner (GER).

# UNION GRAND PRIX Welzheim (GER)

The Deutscher Schutzenbund (German Shooting Federation) conducted an almost flawless Championship in 5 days of again, almost perfect weather. 28 countries from all over the world attended this important Tournament. Important because the new Olympic format was used which gave all of the Teams a full-scale test of his exciting new competition.

This Tournament, held every second year, has always brought many nations to compete but never this number. Indeed, more countries were present than have attended some Olympic Games.

Franz Baum, the Tournament Organizer, supported by an expert team had considered every detail of computer control, leaderboard, scoring, and (of great importance) had a small reproduction of the actual targets of the archers in the spectators' area so that a few seconds after the archers matched in the finals round had shot their arrows, they were displayed for the spectators. (I hope Barcelona works as well).

The tension and excitement exhibited in the completely packed bleachers was spontaneous and, for the first time, uncontrolled. They cheered their Champions after every arrow. The spectators in the grandstand often reacted like soccer fans when a goal is scored - and as far as I could tell, the archers loved it! Certainly if the scores shot were any indication, the response of the spectators had a positive effect on the athletes.

Kim Soo Nyung of Korea tied her own 30 metre World Record of 357 points, and an almost unknown archer from Spain, Mr. Antonio Vazquez shot a new World Record of 358 points at 30 metres, breaking Takayoshi Matsushita of Japan's 1986 record of 357 points.

Again, for the first time in FITA, the individuals and Teams taking part in the Finals were loudly cheered when introduced to the spectators and I am sure this built up their adrenalin and confidence just before the match.

As was expected, the Korean Women again dominated the field taking 1,2 and 4th place in the Open Round and 1,2 and 3rd in the Finals. (cont. page 18)

## SKI - ARC

Archery and skiing are becoming dual event. The Congress held in Krakow introduced a certain number of FITA novelties and rules. Some new tendencies which started to flourish owing to the new Olympic Formula and recognition of ski-arc are in full course. The world of archery will be for sure stirred up by the dynamics of the new event. The ski-archer is a new type of athlete who will be chosen among skiers. These athletes will be further trained in archery.

It is easier to urge a skier to become an archer, than the archer to become a skier. He should undergo a compulsory training for a skier and obtain a perfect skill in this field. The training in archery differs completely from the one in skiing, because the competitor has to shoot precisely and fast. The main point is to hit the target in the middle. He will get a penalty for each error and that will be one round penalty skiing for every missed arrow. Therefore, the Associations should create a new generation of archers in a new style of competition, thus developing a new dimension of archery.

This event could be placed among other sports which are on the Olympic schedule and in this way preserve archery as a competitive discipline if target archery be excluded.

This possibility should urge our efforts towards the development of this new sport. As soon as we would be able to have at our disposal some editorial data on the nature of this event, we would be able to give a more complete review showing the profile of the competitor:

- good skiers as well as round athletes.
- perfectly trained archers, because the penalty points will have a great influence on the final result.
- trained for increased physical strains to obtain the best possible result in all-round competition without causing harm to any of the two events.
- rather concentrated and trying to win, prepared for the change of rhythm in various stages of competition.

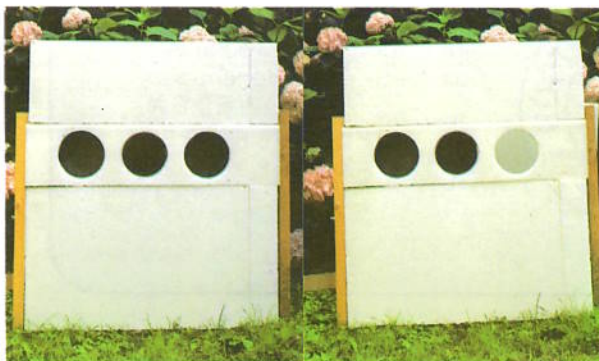
This list doesn't state some negative characteristics but includes a certain number of positive ones:

- higher dynamics and appeal for the young.
- the event becomes more attractive and the spectators take an active participation in it which has already been seen at the competition in Italy. From this point of view archery presents a real spectacle.

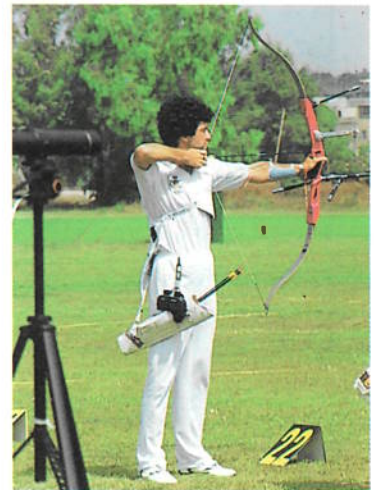
The spectators can enjoy in competition and support the competitors while watching for example, the archer who has to shoot penalty shots on moving targets. These competitions could be held in the summer period too, because the rules allow the possibility of organizing the tournament on skies with wheels along the roads or walking through fields and over hills.

This new event should be welcomed into FITA, because it is going to broaden the number of fans in this field.

*Franco Carminati, an architect and Member of the FITA SKI-ARC Working Group, during the championship in the Netherlands, showed the FITA President and FITA Council Members new targets made according to*



*his sketches. SKI-ARC target is very simple and functional. An archer should shoot with a blunt tip arrows so when the arrow hits the target it just returns. If the arrow hits the black ring it falls down leaving a very visible hole and both the spectators as well as TV broadcasters can easily follow the tournament. Pulling the rope from the shooting posts the target is put into the basic position. President of FITA, Jim Easton, as well as Council Members expressed their favourable opinion and preliminary expected it. Decision will be made at the Council Meeting in Istanbul (TUR) this October. The very important decision is the one about distances in compound and free-style as well as the diameter of the black ring. Bravo Franco!*



**ANTONIO VAZQUEZ (ESP)  
NEW WORLD RECORD**

At the Tournament of Nations held in Walzheim (GER), which was brilliantly organized, a new world record was set by Antonio Vazquez Megido (ESP) bringing it by two points to the maximum.

It was also a big surprise, because Antonio, till now, was not a big name on championships and international tournaments.

He was born on January 26th, 1961, in Levinco, Asturias (ESP) and now lives in Oviedo. He is 176 cm tall and weighs 76 kg. He started with shooting in 1979. He is a member of the "Arco Oviedo" club and Victor Sidoruk, an ex-champion of the world, is his coach helping him in everything.

Vazquez says: "I practise every day from 9-13 a.m. and 4-8 p.m. shooting approximately 300-400 arrows at long distances. While aiming my sight freely circles at ten. As an additional training I took swimming and weightlifting. My hobby is: ARCHERY. I finished the college, I am not married and have no children. I participated at the 1980. Olympiad in Moscow (29th), and 1988. Olympiad in Seoul (32nd). I like FITA ROUND but in my opinion at 50 and 30 meter distances we should also shoot with six arrows.

The shooting time should be shorter too. I prefer duels in the individual and team events, like those in the finals of the Olympic Round, rather than the finals of the Grand FITA Round. All my attention is dedicated to the archery and I am looking forward to take part at the Olympics in Barcelona."

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## EDITORIAL

This issue will feature a report on the World Field Archery Championships in Margraten, the European and Mediterranean Target Archery Championships and several Olympic Round test tournaments. The next issue will be dedicated to results and photos of the Olympic Games.

Most of my attention over the last six months has been on the refinement of the Olympic Round. I have attended a test tournament in Phoenix and in Welzheim during the last three months and the Olympic Round seems to be gaining favor with the archers and it is a definite winner with the spectators.

After observing the last test tournament in Germany, Stan Patterson, Don Lovo (the Technical Delegates to Barcelona), Klaus Röttger (Chairman of the Target Archery Committee) and I reviewed all aspects of the Round and sent a clarification covering the questions that showed up during the test tournaments.

We feel we are well prepared for the Olympic Games. We must put on a professionally orchestrated archery event that is a challenge for the archers and an interesting and exciting competition for the broadcasters and spectators.

The IOC Executive Committee and the IOC Program Commission have been invited to visit our finals. I have personally invited Mr. Samaranch and he will attend. We will proudly show the new Olympic Round and hope that our efforts will convince the IOC to keep archery in the Games for the year 2000 and beyond.

In the early part of May I attended the ASOIF (Association of Summer Olympic International Federations) with Beppe Cinnirella, FITA Secretary-General. This meeting covered many items concerning the Olympics in Barcelona and a few items for the Atlanta Games.

In June I went to Margraten, The Netherlands, for the XIII World Field Archery Championships. The tournament was set up in a quarry with very steep terrain. It was a very challenging course and I congratulate the champions and all archers that participated. You will read about the Championships in this Bulletin. The next World Field Championship will be held in France in 1994. We trust they will give us a well organized and successful tournament.

The Development and Technical Assistance Committee (DTAC) has had successful development missions to Suriname and Peru (with Ecuador attending) and with several more planned to Africa and South America. The United States National Archery Association has sent a development mission to Trinidad and Norway visited Iceland. Both these were a result of our Adopt-A-Country program. I encourage all of our Member Associations to join us in developing archery in one or more countries and adding these new countries as active FITA members.

We must increase our membership to over 100 countries before 1996 and that total must be without counting the newly formed countries resulting from the break-up of some European countries, as the IOC will add those new countries to the total members they require.

FITA now stands at 87 Member Associations, but includes Polynesia, Ecuador, Peru, Turkmenistan and Moldavia. Our development program is critical for archery to remain popular enough to deserve to be a part of the Summer Olympic Games. If your association can help us, please write me directly.

In order to see Olympic archery on TV, every Member Association must contact the TV broadcaster in their country that will transmit the Olympics. Ask them to show the new Olympic archery competition and especially the Olympic finals for women on August 2, for men on August 3, and for teams on August 4.

I hope to have a great report for you after Barcelona. Thanks for all your support.
