






FROM THE PRESIDENT

You have received the first regular edition of *The Arrow* which replaces the previous *FITA Bulletin*. FITA plans to publish five editions of the regular issue and one year-end edition that will tell the story of the competitive year in photos, plus will include reports from all committee chairmen and FITA officers.

Future editions will carry the new Archers Ranking List. Before the 1995 season is over, we plan to have two ranking lists; one will be based on scores of the outdoor FITA rounds, the other will be based on match competition results. Our Ad Hoc Ranking Task Force, chaired by Lynne Evans, has done a good job in preparing a system that gives different values to various tournaments and different values to the level of match competition that the archer has reached. Our goal is to test the new system in 1995, with full implementation by 1996.

Since my election to the International Olympic Committee, my new duties have kept me very busy:

- 1. As an IOC member, I am automatically on the United States Olympic Committee Executive Board and the Board of Directors. The USOC had an annual Congress in November which I attended as a member of both groups.
- 2. This new position also places me on the Executive Board of the Organizing Committee of any Winter or Summer Olympic Games held in the United States. In this capacity, I was invited to attend the ANOC (Association of National Olympic Committees) meetings in Atlanta and have just returned from that trip.
- 3. As an IOC member in the USA, I was also present at the 2002 Winter Games Evaluation Commission at the request of the Salt Lake City Bid Committee. FITA's goal is to have Ski-Arc as a part of the 2002 Games and we have a good chance if the Games are awarded to Salt Lake City.
- 4. In January, I will visit the USOC headquarters in Colorado Springs to learn more about its organization and meet with the directors and managers.
- 5. At the end of January, I will go to Lausanne with the Salt Lake City Bid Committee when they make their presentation to the IOC. The competition will be narrowed to four cities and the final vote will be held in June in Budapest.

The November 18, 1994 edition of the Olympic Qualification Procedure, plus the Olympic Round Description for the Olympic Games and World Championships were revised to reflect the latest changes, printed on blue paper and sent by airmail to all Member Associations.

FROM THE PRESIDENT

The Olympic Qualification Procedure now contains the changes requested by the European Union which allow the top eight teams at the World Championships to each earn three places for their country at the 1996 Olympics. We will announce the Qualification tournament sites for the Continental Unions as soon as they are available.

All motions for our 1995 Congress are being reviewed by the FITA Permanent Committees and will be distributed by January 15, 1995. Member Associations and Council then have until March 10, 1995 to submit amendments. No amendments will be allowed after March 10th.

Meetings are planned for the Target Archery Committee, Field Archery Committee and Constitution and Rules Committee at the 1995 World Championships. These meetings will be held prior to Congress so all motions can be discussed by interested delegates. This will save time on the floor of Congress and will allow us to get through our work in two days.

On a recent business trip to Australia, I visited with James Sirok, president of the Archery Association of the Northern Mariana Islands, and Tom Jorgenson, president, and Don McLeish, secretary, of the Australian Archery Association. The Oceania Archery Union had just met and prepared their constitution. We now have, or have nearly completed, Continental Unions in Europe, Asia, the Americas and Oceania. Africa is in the early stages of progress and Don Lovo will work with them further on his next visit to Africa in early 1995.

Don McLeish has been reappointed as Regional Coordinator for DTAC. I plan to present a motion to Congress to allow for a DTAC Regional Coordinator for each continent.

Mike Frane of the USA has been appointed chairman of the Ad Hoc Ski-Arc Committee. Per Bostad had been kept very busy as chairman of both the Field Archery Committee and the Ski-Arc Committee and we thank him for carrying that double duty.

This was a busy year for FITA with two World Championships, the European Championships, the Championships of the Americas, the Asian Games, the Masters Games and the Goodwill Games. We will also have a very active 1995 with the World Indoor Championships in Birmingham, England, and the World Outdoor Championships in Jakarta, Indonesia.

I hope you all had a happy holiday season and best wishes for a great new year.


and I scored 119 points out of 120 possible—

In addition to great competition at the Goodwill Games, the World Field and the World Junior Championships, sensational shooting marked marvelous regional championships in three regions. The compound archery record list was re-written at the Championships of Europe and the Mediterranean, while new champions emerged at both the Asian Games in Hiroshima, JPN and at the Championships of the Americas held outside of Havana, CUB.

XII CHAMPIONSHIPS OF THE AMERICAS

Havana, CUB (November 3-9) - The new compound division highlighted strong competition in the 12th continental championships of the Western Hemisphere.

In the absence of the United States team, which could not attend due to political difficulties between the U.S. government and the host nation, a pitched battle for overall supremacy raged between the teams from Mexico and Brazil. The Mexicans were best in the Olympic Division and ended up with 11 gold medals, best among all nations. But the Brazilians had a huge edge in the Compound Division and had the most medals overall, 26. The host nation had a strong showing, winning seven medals - the third-highest total among all nations.

XII ASIAN GAMES

Hiroshima, JPN (October 6-7) - A strong field faced off in the 12th Asian Games, dominated as expected by the outstanding and experienced Korean squad. Reigning World Champion Kyung-Mo Park averaged 113.33 points in his last three matches to win the men's gold medal while 1991 World Championships silver medalist Eun-Kyung Lee fought off teammate Jung-Ah Lim in a shoot-off after a 104-104 tie after 12 arrows in the gold medal match.

China was the surprise winner of the women's team title, after Indonesia's trio of Rusena Gelanteh, Dahliana Dahliana and Purnama Pandiangan shocked the favored Korean squad in the semifinals, 237-236. After that emotional win, the Indonesians fell short of China's Xiaozhu Wang, Ying He and Sang Lin, 240-231 in the final and had to settle for the silver medal.

XIV CHAMPIONSHIPS OF EUROPE AND THE MEDITERRANEAN

Nymburk, CZE (July 12-14) - Good weather, a picturesque site and a high-profile championship tournament combined to produce sensational results at the 1994 edition of the Championships of Europe and the Mediterranean. The world record lists were completely re-written in the Compound division, which made its first appearance in this tournament.

In the Olympic Division, defending men's champion Sebastien Flute (FRA) cruised into the final, but lost to Finland's 21-year-old Jari Lipponen, 114-110. Among the women, Russia's Elena Toutachikova led the qualifying, won two face-to-face matches by one point each and the other four by an average of more than 12 points to win the individual title easily.
